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FAMOUS BENTLEY BLOWER REBORN

Bentley Motors and The Little Car Company unveil a road-legal, 85 per cent scale recreation of the most famous Bentley in the world - Blower Jnr.

lower Jnr, a recreation of the 1929 4½-litre Supercharged Team Car No. 2 in Bentley's Heritage Collection, is the first road-legal car from The Little Car Company and the most sophisticated city car ever built. Crafted by hand to the same standards as any Bentley, and adorned with beautiful details all inspired by the original Team car, Blower Jnr is built around a 48V electric powertrain with a 15 kW (20 bhp) motor, meaning a top speed of 45 mph / 72 km/h in the UK and EU (25 mph / 40 km/h in the USA due to (legislation) and an expected range of around 65 miles, with tandem seating for two adults.

A FAITHFUL HOMAGE

Beyond the headline figures, the beauty of Blower Jnr is in the recreation and repurposing of details from the original car. The frame is painted steel, to which an authentic chassis specification is attached. Leaf springs and scaled-down, period-correct friction dampers bring a comfortable ride, while Brembo disc brakes at the front and drums at the rear provide the stopping power. The electric motor is mounted across the rear axle, while the batteries and drive electronics are all housed in a hidden undertray.

The bodywork is crafted in two sections, and while the rear body structure is crafted in carbon fibre rather than being an ash frame, it's covered in impregnated fabric, just as the original. The bonnet, with its multiple cooling louvres, is hand-crafted in aluminium using traditional techniques and fastened with beautiful leather buckled bonnet straps.

At the front of the car, the supercharger now houses the charging port that connects the onboard charger to any Type

At first glance, the dashboard looks like a scaled-down replica of the original, with Engine Turned Aluminium forming the dashboard itself. Other switchgear for the headlights and indicators copies the form and materiality of the magneto switches from the Team Car, while the battery charge gauge recreates the original ammeter.

THE FIRST EDITION

The first 99 examples of Blower Jnr will be First Edition Models. These will feature First Edition badging on the hood, door sill plate and dash as well as an engraved and numbered '1 of 99' plaque.

All First Edition models will be finished in Blower Green, with matching painted chassis and wheels, and a Union flag hand-painted on both sides of the body as per the original, while the seats and interior are upholstered in the Dark Green Lustrana Hide used by Mulliner for the Blower Continuation Series. The side panel and radiator carry the period-correct racing number, while the steering wheel is rope-bound.

THE ORIGINAL SUPERCHARGED 4 ½ LITRE 'BLOWER' TEAM CAR NO. 2

No other pre-war Bentley had an impact like the supercharged 4½-litre 'Blower' Bentley. The Blower

Bentleys was born from a philosophy devised by Sir Tim Birkin – notable racing driver and Bentley Boy – to extract more speed from the racing Bentleys of the day.

The cars competed in twelve races, the most famous being Team Car No. 2's adventure at the 1930 Le Mans 24 Hours. The Blower Continuation Series is the world's first pre-war continuation, and the final car is in the final stages of build now. A second Continuation Series of 12 Bentley Speed Six models is currently in development.

MONTEREY CAR WEEK GLOBAL DEBUT

Blower Jnr will make its world debut in front of 100 VIPs at Monterey Car Week, ahead of a schedule of appearances across the weekend. Production is expected to begin in the second quarter of 2024, starting with the 99 First Edition models.

A JOYOUS CELEBRATION OF LOVE

Traditional Uttarakhand Weddings are known for their distinctive and romantic conjugal ceremonies

Ithough the different ceremonies and traditions before, during, and after the wedding are extremely elaborate, the Kumaoni or Garhwali weddings of the ethnic communities in Uttarakhand are very simple.

These ceremonies capture the essence of the state's rich cultural fabric, melding both simplicity and grandeur in a breathtaking tableau. Whether it's a Kumaoni or Garhwali

wedding, representing the major ethnic communities of Uttarakhand, the approach to marital bliss is elegantly straightforward, yet steeped in elaborate customs and traditions.

From pre-wedding rituals to post-wedding celebrations, each aspect is meticulously curated, reflecting a lifestyle deeply rooted in heritage and community values. So come, explore the lesser-known, but profoundly beautiful, nuptial

practices of Uttarakhand—a symphony of culture, love, and unity.

PRE-WEDDING RITUALS

ENGAGEMENT

Kumaoni marriages, like other weddings, include an engagement ritual that is considerably different from others. Instead of the bride and groom, the dads of the soon-to-bemarried pair exchange rings.

MEHENDI CEREMONY

The Mehendi ceremony, in which henna is applied on the bride's hands and feet, follows the engagement. Both parties participate in the Mehendi ritual. The bride has a composed entirely henna pattern applied to her hands, arms, and feet. The groom opts for a basic yet understated henna design that adorns his hands.

WEDDING RITUALS

GANESH PUJA

Even before the start of the wedding festivities, the bride and groom's families appeal to Lord Ganesha for the ceremonies to be performed without any difficulties. The Ganesh me doob dharan is the name for this. Following that, the proper rites begin. After aabdev purvanga, ganesh puja, matrika puja, nandishradh, punanahavachan, kalash sthapan, and Navagraha pooja, the main lamp, or pradhaan diya, is lit.

In addition to these ceremonies, the bride and groom are smeared with turmeric or haldi by family members, and then they take a ceremonial bath. A bracelet in the shape of a little bale is wrapped around the hands of the woman, with betelnut and coins inserted in a yellow-coloured piece of cloth.

SUWAL PATHAL

This one-of-a-kind Kumaoni wedding tradition involves kneading wheat flour into dough and rolling it into circles. After immersing it in dry flour, it is dried in the sun. They are deep-fried after drying and presented to the gods as a Prasada.

DULIAGARH

Once the groom's party arrives at the bride's door in the evening, unmarried girls greet them with pots full of water or kalash on their heads. The groom is carried and taken to the courtyard's Dhuliarghay chauki, which is built of red clay and biswar rice flour. Numerous symbols such as kamal, kalash, shankh, chakra, and gada are included in this geometrical pattern.

Two chaukis (wooden stools) are set on top of this. The groom and the priest are expected to stand respectfully on

these chaukis. The groom, or var, is revered as a manifestation of Vishnu. The daughter's father applies tilak and distributes gifts like as money and clothes after cleaning the feet of var and aacharya.

VARMAALA

This is essentially a garlands-exchanging ceremony that takes place after Duliagarh, when the groom advances to the centre stage. The bride joins him immediately after he takes his seat. The bride and groom's family and a few close friends also join them on stage for this momentous occasion. The couple exchanges the Jai Mala, and the crowd applauds them with a round of applause, as well as a few pleasant jokes and giggles.

KANYADAAN

After the social formalities are completed, the priest takes over and performs a number of sacred rituals and ceremonies as prescribed by the 'lagna' (the positioning of the stars according to the horoscope of the bride and groom). This ceremony normally lasts a few hours and lasts all night until morning.

The bride's father and mother next perform the emotive and most essential ritual, the 'Kanyadaan.' On this day, the bride's parents conduct a fast. Kanyadaan is regarded as the most significant donation that anyone can give. The bride becomes a lifelong member of the groom's family and his better half after performing the ritual.

SAPTAPADI

The bride and groom make seven rounds around the holy fire as a symbol of their devotion to one other in this ritual. To demonstrate their unity, the husband leads the bride in four rounds around the sacred fire, and then the bride takes over and does three circles. The bride and groom are pronounced husband and wife when this procedure is completed.

VIDAI

Finally, the Vidai ritual takes place, during which the bride's family bids their precious daughter farewell. The bride, as well as her family and friends, are feeling mixed emotions as she prepares to go to her husband's house and leave her parents behind.

POST-WEDDING RITUALS

The Bride's Welcome and Formal Introduction - The bride is greeted by her mother-in-law or the groom's elder sister when she arrives at the groom's house. All members of the family and their relatives are properly introduced to the new bride. Also, she is given an outline of her upcoming role and obligations.

After all of these procedures and rituals are accomplished, the bride and other female family members proceed to a water spring (called naula or dhara) bearing an urn of water or kalash on their heads. She then submerges in the water all of the things used in the puja rites.

WEDDING ATTIRE

A dhoti-kurta, sherwani, or formal suit is suitable for the groom's attire. The traditional Kumaoni or Garhwali bride would wear a traditional 'Ghagri,' which is a skirt-like garment similar to the ghaghra, along with a 'choli,' (the blouse), and a traditional 'Pichora,' which is also known as 'Rangwali,' and is a traditional 'odhni,' or veil, that is accessorised with silver and gold tatting. The less traditional Uttarakhand bride, on the other hand, prefers to wear a saree instead of the ghagri-pichora.

TRADITIONAL WEDDING FOOD

In a traditional Uttarakhand Wedding, the food served reflects the rich culinary heritage of the region. A simple yet delicious feast that balances both flavour and nutrition, the menu often features local and seasonal ingredients. Among

the must-try dishes are 'Aloo Ke Gutke,' a spicy potato preparation, and 'Gahat Ki Dal,' a unique lentil dish often served with rice. No meal is complete without 'Kumaoni Raita,' a yoghurt-based accompaniment flavoured with turmeric and mustard. 'Jhangora Ki Kheer,' a dessert made from a local variety of millet, provides a sweet ending to the lavish spread.

For those with a taste for non-vegetarian cuisine, 'Kumaoni Chicken Curry' is often the star of the show. This culinary repertoire not only tantalizes the taste buds but also provides a window into the rich, agrarian lifestyle that defines Uttarakhand. It's a feast that complements the grandeur of the wedding rituals, adding another layer of cultural richness to these extraordinary celebrations.

Garhwali and Kumaoni cuisines, two of Uttarakhand's primary regions, dominate the traditional wedding cuisine. Simple, locally grown ingredients are used in the meals, which are not overpowered by complicated spices. Lentils are used in some of Uttarakhand's most famous meals, which are cooked over low heat.

KAFULI

Kafuli is a popular Uttarakhand dish made with spinach and fenugreek leaves. This unusual cuisine is served with hot steaming rice and cooked in an iron kadhai.

PHAANU

Phaanu is a meal that is popular in Uttarakhand's Garhwal region. It's a little tricky to make because it's produced by combining lentils of various sorts that have been soaked in water overnight. It's a soupy dish that's usually served with rice.

KANDALEE KA SAAG

Kandalee Ka Saag is a quintessential dish that graces the tables at traditional Uttarakhand weddings. Made from a unique variety of leafy greens native to the Himalayan region, this dish is a testament to the state's rich biodiversity. Delicately spiced and slow-cooked to perfection, Kandalee Ka Saag is not just a culinary delight but also a symbol of the local culture.

DUBUK

Dubuk, hailed as one of Uttarakhand's best meals, enchants diners with its incomparable flavour. It's a Dal recipe that's best eaten with rice. You might be wondering what makes a simple Dal dish so remarkable. This comforting stew-like concoction is made primarily from lentils and local beans, infused with an array of indigenous spices and herbs. JHANGORA KI KHEER

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

NORWAY'S LUXURY CABINS ABOVE THE FJORDS

You get a real sense of hovering high above one of Norway's most beautiful fjords at The Bolder

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Ith its distinctive design and location by the Lysefjord, The Bolder has become one of Norway's most remarkable places to stay. The three new cabins designed by architect firm Snøhetta are now ready to offer guests an experience of nature that is far beyond the ordinary.

The weather is really wet and windy as we park the car at dusk on a winter's day, a few dozen kilometres from Stavanger in Fjord Norway. The atmosphere becomes increasingly magical as we leave the car and walk the narrow and under-lit walkway. There's a rush of excitement as we glance at the outline of one of the five-sided wooden

cabins between the pine trees, standing on a column a few metres above the ground, at the very edge of the outcrop. All that's behind it are the sky and fjord.

HOVERING OVER THE LYSEFJORD

The hairs on the back of our necks stand up as we open the door to the lodge. Our eyes are drawn to the enormous panoramic window looking out towards the Lysefjord – like a landscape taken straight out of a painting. The door to the right is to a bathroom, which lives up to our expectations of sky-high standards. Wow, this really is exclusive. In front of us is a wonderful, inviting double bed with panoramic

windows on two sides and views over the Lysefjord. Next to that is a narrow, steep and elegant staircase that leads up to the floor above, which has a modern and well-equipped kitchen. The views from the panoramic window are simply breathtaking.

The high ceiling makes you feel that the sky and the lodge are at one with each other. There's only air below us and it feels like we're hovering high above the fjord with no one else around. Talk about hitting the jackpot. There is nowhere else I'd rather be.

THE BOLDER JUST GOT EVEN BOLDER

The first two lodges, called The Bolder Skylodge, have been a massive success. What developed from the slightly wild brainchild of printer and founder Tom B. Norland soon became known as one of the most remarkable places to stay in Norway. The meeting between unique architecture and nature was the starting point for further developing the project The Bolder Starlodge.

The new Starlodges build on the experience we gained from the first two lodges we built. They are 40% larger, have an even higher standard, and are more at one with nature in terms of their location and the choice of materials,' says Norland. Experience shows that 80% of the guests so far have been couples, so the new lodges only have one double bed.

They are designed as high-quality accommodations for people who want to enjoy nature, the views and each other. Two of the lodges are located right on the edge, which gives guests a unique sense of hovering in and being at one with, nature and the elements. These lodges are unique.

'Staying in these lodges really does something to you. It's a whole new way of experiencing nature and seeing one of Norway's finest fjords. You can drive right up to the lodges, so the accommodation is accessible throughout the year. The experience is perhaps most magical in the autumn, winter and spring,' Norland continues.

QUALITY AND RESPECT IN EVERY DETAIL

The eye for detail, quality and nature are what inspired the renowned Norwegian architecture firm Snøhetta to take on The Bolder project. Creativity, and a shared interest in and respect for nature, meant the collaboration quickly came to fruition. 'It's not often we get to work on projects on such a small scale as this one, but it's been a very important and exciting project for us.

It's been challenging but in a positive way. We normally try to find clients who have a vision and leave room for the creative process. What excited us about this project was the commitment to quality, luxury, and the desire to create something in harmony with nature, says Frank Denis Foray, the project manager at Snøhetta who worked on The Bolder Starlodge. The architects at Snøhetta rented a motorhome for several days in order to really get a sense of the place and devise a project that respects the landscape and shows consideration for mother nature.

'We saw a unique possibility with the network of paths and the landscape. We wanted to make the smallest possible footprint in what we did and we had to remain mindful of this throughout the process. The idea was to convey a sense of buildings standing free in nature and for

guests to feel alone in nature. At the same time, we wanted to use elements from the landscape in the design and let the mountain blend into the foundations and the rough style of the timber,' Foray continues.

THE CHAIR YOU NEVER WANT TO LEAVE

This is where Snøhetta and The Bolder have really hit the mark. The foundation on which the cabins 'float' uses rock from the granite mountain on which it rests. The timber is from the same type of trees that surround the lodges, and the choice of interior materials creates a sense of being sheltered, which shows respect for the landscape in which the lodges are situated. The lodges are lofty and the light creates a unique sense of space.

There is real quality in every last detail. Everything has been carefully considered, from the choice of kitchen knives to the type of wood used for the furniture. Everything oozes quality, with brands that include Vipp, Expo Nova and Eikund.

When you sit in the chair on the first floor and rest your legs on the small pouffe, you feel like you never want to get up again. The unique comfort combined with the atmosphere in the room let your mind wander. You can cook what you fancy, eat breakfast around the small table with four chairs, or just relax.

IN TOUCH WITH NATURE

When the founder and Snøhetta describe the lodges as being 'in harmony with nature', it doesn't just mean that the buildings have a unique connection to the landscape, that the choice of materials is well considered, or that the buildings leave a minimal footprint in the landscape.

Staying a night or two in the small lodges promises a rare experience of nature, and the opportunity to experience Norwegian fjord landscapes in a whole new way. There is a network of paths in the area that leads to viewpoints where you can enjoy views of the fjord landscape in various ways.

One of the paths is part of a new route to Preikestolen (the Pulpit Rock), which is accessible to all.

The intention behind the lodges is to allow guests to also enjoy the beautiful nature around the lodges. What's important is that the experience lasts for twenty-four hours and that it's a place where you can enjoy high standards while living in and with nature. That's the feeling we were going for and which I hope we've achieved,' concludes Foray from Snøhetta.


PUT EVERYTHING ELSE ON HOLD

Not many people have had the opportunity to set foot in one of the newly built cabins. From the response so far, The Bolder may be about to become an even bigger attraction than the founders initially envisioned.

Everything else is put on hold. You can't help being drawn into the 'here and now' and you just don't want to be anywhere else. It's the time-out that everyone needs and that many are seeking. If you're in a relationship, it's a great place for good conversation, and if you're alone it's a great place to find yourself. I would sacrifice a lot of other holidays to experience this place.

tableau of Thailand's rich culture and heritage, its ancient traditions and folklore, and its reverence towards the divine.

TIMELESS TRADITIONS: 100-YEAR-OLD THAI VILLAGES

Our experience began with a tour of a carefully recreated century-old Thai village. Each corner of the village personified a different region of Thailand, encapsulating the essence of a bygone era. The architecture, the climate, and even the social structures were reminiscent of the cultural fabric that has been woven over centuries.

And with so much and more to experience and enjoy, I was completely bowled over by the half-day tour spent in a Thai Cultural Experience that transports you back in time, immersing you in the rich tapestry of the region's history and culture. It transcended beyond the realms of time, becoming a vibrant

I witnessed the unique architectural style and lifestyles of the villagers, all influenced by the local geography, climate, and social aspects of each region.

In the Central Plain, the houses are raised high to avoid flooding during the monsoon. The Northeast, dominated

by highlands and less fertile soil, has homes that are smaller, simpler, and often elevated from the ground. In the South, fishing activities reign, and the people enjoy their spicy cuisine.

Stepping into the 100-Year Thai Village in the Central Plain is like embarking on a journey back in time. From the moment I enter, I'm captivated by the architectural brilliance and wisdom of the ancient Thai people, who designed their houses in accordance with the geography, climate, and social aspects of each region.

During the dry season, the traditional Thai house is conveniently located on fertile lowland soil. But here's the genius part, as monsoon season swings around, the river overflows and the houses, already elevated, become safe havens. The ground floor, now vacated, stores fishing and farming equipment.

The rivers and canals that slice through the central plain offer a unique mode of transport. Each house possesses its own pier, allowing locals to navigate their way around using boats. The community activities here are delightful - weaving traditional fish decorations from palm leaves, tasting authentic Thai rice and coconut snacks, and of course, boat rides!

Shifting gears, my next stop is the 100-Year Thai Village in the Northeast. Again, geography dictates the lifestyle here. The Northeast's highlands aren't as agriculturally friendly as the Central Plains, meaning the locals tend to be less wealthy. Their houses are simple yet resourceful, elevated above the ground with spaces below for storing food and fermented products like fish. What stands out here is the infectious joy of the community.

They're always celebrating, gathering for feasts, sharing food, and creating a sense of warmth that's truly contagious. Heading south, I explore the 100-Year Thai Village in the South. The villagers here live a life imbued with the flavour of the sea. They're fisherfolk who love spicy food and gathering for dinner. Their choice of entertainment? "Nang Talung", a traditional shadow play. And don't even get me started on their Hula Dance - it's really magnetic!

During the tour, I come across Muay Thai, Thailand's national sport and ancient martial art. With roots in "Muay Boran," it originated as a form of self-defence for weaponless soldiers. In

fact, it's said that Muay Boran played a part in keeping Thailand the only Southeast Asian nation that was never colonized. In the 1700s, Muay Thai transitioned from battlefield to sport, with soldiers training during peace times. No rounds, no time limits, and rarely a referee - it was survival of the fittest.

One story stands out. In 1774, after the Burmese invasion of the Ayutthaya kingdom, Nai Kanom Tom, a Thai prisoner, was chosen to fight against the Burmese champion. He knocked him out but the win was deemed invalid due to a supposed distraction by the music. Undeterred, Nai Kanom Tom faced nine more fighters and took them all down, single-handedly. The impressed Burmese King granted him and all his fellow Thai prisoners freedom. This victory is celebrated annually in Thailand on March 17th - Muay Thai Day. The tour is without a doubt, a definitive must-see, an enriching experience that beautifully articulated the spirit and essence of Thailand.

AN OUTDOOR AMPHITHEATER WITH GREAT PERFORMANCES

As dusk fell, the ambient music began to resonate through the outdoor amphitheatre, summoning us to several outdoor breathtakingly beautiful performances. Dancers draped in colourful traditional attires swayed and pirouetted, embodying legends, gods, and goddesses of Thai lore. The mesmerizing display seemed to bridge the gap between the past and present.

Finally, the climactic moment arrived. The grand finale - a 90-minute spectacle - was a theatrical marvel that encapsulated Thai culture and history in an electrifying dance and musical show. The Siam Niramit in Phuket was not merely a show; it was a mesmerizing experience that unfolded like an elaborate storybook.

SPECTACULAR SIAM NIRAMIT PHUKET SHOW

As the curtains parted on a vast stage with special effects, a fantastical adventure awaited me at one of the world's finest performances, the renowned Siam Niramit Show, The state-of-the-art stage effects were surreal, sending me spiralling back in time, a willing passenger in a vibrant time machine.

I felt history unfold before my very eyes, so lucid, so alive, so teeming with energy.

This show was my gateway to the rich, intriguing past and vibrant culture of Thailand. Witnessing a grand performance on a colossal stage that stretched 65 meters wide, plunged 40 meters deep, and towered 10 meters high, was beyond incredible.

Over a hundred performers swirled and danced in front of my awestruck eyes, wearing a dazzling array of 500 costumes. More than 100 resplendent set pieces and artistic backdrops filled the scene with overwhelming realism. The special effects, like the sudden appearance of a river on stage and the realistic flight of angels, were the cherries on top of an already magnificent spectacle. I can assert with certainty that the Siam Niramit Phuket Show is a must-see! Each performance, each scene was enriched with artistic backdrops and astonishing special effects.

I took a deep dive into the lore of the Siam Niramit Show, focusing particularly on the depiction of Siva, the sacred Thai belief. Siva, known as Shiva in India and "Phra Siwa" or "Phra Isuan" in Thailand, holds an essential place in the cultural ethos of both countries. In Thailand, this deity is associated with the cycle of creation, preservation, and dissolution - each phase is intrinsically tied to the process of destruction and transformation. Far from being negative, this is viewed as a necessary, harmonious part of existence.

The image of Siva, armed with four different symbols, speaks volumes about Thai culture. Each arm cradles an element, a trident symbolizing Siva's power, a drum echoing the sound of the universe, a flame signifying the transformative power of destruction, and the final arm raised in blessing. This lore is brought to life during the vibrant "Phi Ta Khon" festival

in the town of Dan Sai, where celebrants wear flamboyant masks and costumes, many depicting Siva.

The Siam Niramit show illuminated my understanding of Siva, or as the Thai people know him, Phra Siwa or Phra Isuan. Although a prominent deity in Hinduism, his influence has travelled far and wide, resonating even in Thailand.

The Thai people attribute Siva with the power of destruction and transformation, critical elements in the cycle of life. This aspect of their belief was beautifully illustrated in the "Phi Ta Khon" festival dedicated to Siva. The festival was a riot of colours, marked by elaborate masks and costumes, many of which depicted Siva and other Hindu gods. It was fascinating to see how religious beliefs flow across different cultures, and how they evolve and adapt over time.

As I soaked in all these experiences, I could not help but marvel at the fluidity and dynamism of religious beliefs and practices. Siva may have originated in ancient India, but his influence and significance have resonated across cultures, adapting, and evolving with time.

A JOURNEY ACROSS TIME AND CULTURES

As a cultural traveller, the Siam Niramit show was a revelation. It wasn't just a spectacle to be watched, but an engaging narrative to be experienced. With its world-class performances, mesmerizing effects, and captivating storytelling, the Siam Niramit Show unfolds an evening of unforgettable enchantment and grandeur.

My visit to the Siam Niramit Show was not just an evening of enjoyment; it was a journey across time and cultures, a journey that I will treasure forever.

ocated in Northeastern India is the picturesque state of Meghalaya. Bordered by Assam in the North and Bangladesh in the South, Meghalaya is bliss on earth.

Meghalaya literally means – 'The Abode of Clouds,' and as the name suggests, it is the wettest place on earth with an average annual rainfall of 1,150cm.

With almost one-third of the state covered with lush forests, Meghalaya is truly a natural paradise. Meghalaya's ethnic communities add their rich cultural heritage to this verdant wonderland. All this makes for an unforgettable experience when you visit the capital of the state - Shillong!

SHILLONG, THE STATE CAPITAL, IS THE PERFECT TOURIST DESTINATION

Situated at an altitude of 1,520m above sea level, Shillong, the state capital, is the perfect tourist destination. This

picturesque capital is a sight to behold. With its waterfalls, sparkling lakes, pristine brooks, pine groves and gardens, the breathtaking natural beauty of the place enchants visitors who come here from all over the world. Far from the madding crowd, Shillong offers the world-weary traveller a quiet, rejuvenating retreat.

Nestled among forested hills, Shillong experiences a favourable climate throughout the year. There are numerous attractions here that enthrall visitors.

Apart from the numerous waterfalls of spectacular beauty, there are many peaks that offer a panoramic view of the surroundings.

SHILLONG PEAK

Mawsynram is a small village in the Khasi Hills of Meghalaya state, 56km from Shillong. Reportedly the wettest place on earth, Mawsynram receives an average annual rainfall of 11,872mm. A visit to Mawsynram offers an incredible experience of the region's heavy rainfall, lush greenery, and misty landscapes.

The Mawjymbuin Cave, with its stalagmite formation resembling a Shivalinga, is a popular attraction, along with numerous waterfalls that come alive during the monsoon season. The village also showcases the unique culture and traditions of the local Khasi tribe.

PARKS AND LAKES AND WATERFALLS

Shillong, is blessed with an abundance of picturesque parks and serene lakes. Umiam Lake, also known as Barapani, is a vast man-made reservoir surrounded by lush greenery, perfect for boating, picnicking, or simply enjoying the

tranquil ambience. Wards Lake is another popular spot, nestled amidst the city's hustle and bustle, with its charming ornamental bridge and vibrant gardens.

Shillong Golf Course is one of the oldest and best natural golf courses in the world. The site where the golf course is located provides a scenic view of the surroundings.


religious landmark. This stunning Gothic-style church, built in 1913, stands atop a hill and is dedicated to Mother Mary.

Previously known as Cherrapunjee, Sohra is located on a plateau on the southern slopes of the state. Dotted with numerous waterfalls cascading over deep gorges, Sohra is a natural wonderland. Set against the backdrop of a stunning

landscape, it is an enchanting corner of the Northeast that is waiting to be discovered.

NATURE QUESTS AND ADVENTURE



HOW TO REACH

BY AIR

There is a small airport at Umroi, about 35km from Shillong. At present, Air India operates with ATR42 type of aircraft on this route. Buses/taxis are available from Shillong to Umroi and back. Another convenient airport, the Gopinath Bordoloi Airport in Guwahati (128km from Shillong) is connected to the rest of

India with regular flights. Helicopter services are also available from Guwahati to Shillong and back daily, except on Sunday.

BY RAIL

There are no rail lines in Meghalaya. The nearest railway station is Guwahati. It is 104km from Shillong and very well connected with all major cities of India.

BY ROAD

National Highway 40, an all-weather road, connects Shillong with Guwahati. State Transport Corporation and private transport operators have services to various places in Meghalaya and to neighbouring states.



There are also several ancient temples and historic sites in the area that offer a glimpse into the rich cultural heritage of Jharkhand.

GETTING THERE: The nearest major city is Ranchi, which can be reached by rail, road, or air. From Ranchi, visitors can hire a car or take a bus to reach the falls, which are located about 80 km away. The journey takes around two hours, and the scenic route offers plenty of opportunities to take in the stunning landscapes of Jharkhand.

USRI FALLS

Usri Falls, a waterfall located in the Giridh district of Jharkhand, is a popular tourist and picnic spot. The Usri River, a tributary of the Barakar River, flows down a steep gorge, before finally falling about 39ft in three separate streams. The scenery encompassing it is breathtaking, and therefore a favourite spot for picnic lovers.

GETTING THERE: Giridh is well connected through both railway and road. Private taxis, tongas, and auto-rickshaws are available. There are regular bus services available from Giridih to other parts of the town. The nearest railway station is Giridh. The nearest airport is Birsa Munda Airport, Ranchi.

HUNDRU FALLS

One can locate Hundru falls about 45km away from the town of Ranchi. The Swarnarekha River, falling from a height of 320ft, is known as the Hundru Falls. A beautiful pool is formed at the base of the fall which allows visitors to enjoy themselves in various ways – bathing, enjoying a picnic, and other activities.

The diverse shape of the rocks found here which has been shaped from attrition by the continuous fall of water, thus enhancing its beauty. The 'Gazetteer of India,' penned by an English writer during the British Raj, extols the place highly, saying that it's a place worth visiting despite its remoteness.

GETTING THERE: Tourists can visit the Hundru falls from Ranchi via the Ormanjhi- Sikidiri route.

DASSAM FALLS

About 40km away from Ranchi , capital of Jharkhand, on Tata Road lies a village called Taimara, near which flows the Kanchi river. Falling from a height of about 144ft, the Kanchi River morphs into a pretty fall called Dassam Falls. It is also known as Dassam Ghagh. The waterfall is enclosed by verdant landscapes which embellish its beauty. The river also offers tourists the chance to engage in some recreational activities like river rafting, swimming, and other water sports.

GETTING THERE: Situated about 40km from Ranchi off the Ranchi Tata highway, you take a right turn from NH-33 at Taimara. 3km after crossing Taimara, there's a diversion from where a left turn takes you to Dassam.

SITA FALLS

Nestled amidst the dense foliage of the forests, lies a beautiful waterfall named Sita Falls. Located near Netarhat in the Latehar district, Sita Falls is a beautiful waterfall surrounded by dense forests. The waterfall is formed by the Koina River, which falls from a height of around 35 meters.

The waterfall gets its name from the Hindu mythology epic, Ramayana, where it is believed that Goddess Sita took a bath in these falls during her exile. As you approach the falls, you can hear the sound of the cascading water and feel the cool mist on your face.

The waterfall is a sight to behold, with water gushing down from a height of over 50 feet into a natural pool below, surrounded by lush greenery. Tourists can indulge in a variety of activities at Sita Falls, starting with a refreshing dip in the natural pool. The water is clean and cool, providing the perfect respite from the heat and humidity of Jharkhand. You can also go for a relaxing swim or spend some time lounging by the pool, admiring the stunning surroundings.

For adventure enthusiasts, Sita Falls offers a range of activities such as trekking and rock climbing. The surrounding forests are home to a diverse range of flora and fauna, and trekking through the area is an excellent way to explore the region's natural beauty.

GETTING THERE: The nearest railway station to Sita Falls is Ranchi railway station, which is approximately 150 kilometers away. The nearest airport is Birsa Munda Airport in Ranchi, which is approximately 150 kilometers away. From the airport, visitors can hire a taxi or take a bus to reach Sita Falls. The best way to reach Sita Falls is by road. The nearest town to Sita Falls is Gumla, which is around 30 kilometers away. From Gumla, visitors can hire a taxi or take a bus to reach Sita Falls.

JONHA FALLS

Jonha is named after the nearest village and is also known as Gautam Dhara, due to a widespread belief that Lord Buddha bathed here. A temple and ashram dedicated to Buddha were built atop Gautam Pahar by the sons of Raja Baldevdas Birla. It's also called Gunga Nala because the stream apparently has its origins in the Ganga ghat. A descent of 453 steps leads one to the base of the waterfall and to the far-flung villages of Konardih and Duarsini on the other side of the stream.

GETTING THERE: From Ranchi, take the NH-32 to Angarha. From there, a left turn takes you 2km to Hundru, whereas the straight road takes you to Jonha and Sita. 16km from Angarha is Amrutbagan Chowk, from where a 5 km drive will take you to Jonha.

AKSHARDHAM TEMPLE, GANDHINAGAR - THE POWER OF FAITH

The Akshardham Temple, situated in Gandhinagar, Gujarat, is one of the biggest Hindu temples in India and overseas. The main god honoured within the temple is Bhagwan Swaminarayan. In addition, there are displays, studies, and historical structures spread around the 23 acres of grounds. This magnificent temple is around 28 km from Ahmedabad in Gandhinagar.

The Akshardham Temple is a marvel of craftsmanship and devotion, showcasing intricate carvings and breathtaking architecture. It serves as a spiritual and cultural centre, promoting peace, harmony, and the teachings of Swaminarayan.

The mandir, the exhibits, and even the grounds reverberate with holiness in Akshardham. Around two hundred murtis (idols) symbolize religious stalwarts through many centuries at the temple. Akshardham's heavenly basis is that every soul can be almighty. A trip to Akshardham is a rewarding experience whether it is comprehending the power of faith, experiencing the intensity of nonviolence, realizing the global nature of ancient beliefs, or just appreciating the beauty of 'God's home on Earth' - each aspect is significant.

SOMNATH TEMPLE, SAURASHTRA - ICONIC AND MAGNIFICENT

An iconic temple is the Somnath Temple, located in Prabhas Patan. It is believed to be one of the twelve Jyotirlingas (manifestations of Lord Shiva) and holds immense significance for Hindus. Somnath Temple, one of India's ancient temples is located at the archaeological site of Veraval city in Saurashtra on Gujarat's west coast. The temple exemplifies the magnificent Chuka contemporary design and is one of the most famous Shiva temples in Gujarat.

The town of Veraval is around 412 km from Ahmedabad, and most visitors to Somnath temple come from Rajkot. Somnath temple's history and folklore contribute to its magnificence and religious significance, and it has always long piqued the imagination of tourists who head to the temple every year. While at Somnath, visit the Triveni Sangam Temple and the Pancha Pandava Gufa, as well as the Parashurama and Suraj temples to get a full spiritual experience.

DWARKADHISH TEMPLE IN DWARKA - A SENSE OF DEEP SPIRITUALITY

A notable temple is the Dwarkadhish Temple in Dwarka, dedicated to Lord Krishna. This ancient temple stands as a testimony to the devotion of Lord Krishna's followers and offers a serene ambience for spiritual seekers.

Built on the site believed to be the ancient kingdom of Lord Krishna, the temple showcases exquisite architecture and intricate carvings that mesmerize. The sanctum sanctorum houses the magnificent idol of Dwarkadhish, a beautifully adorned form of Lord Krishna. The temple's ambience is filled with divine energy and echoes with devotional chants and prayers.

The architectural marvel of the five-storey temple is supported by seventy-two pillars and crowned by a towering spire of 170 feet. Constructed entirely of pristine limestone, it boasts intricate carvings on its exterior with an awe-inspiring display of mythic continuity and design.

Devotees flock to this sacred site to seek blessings, offer prayers, and experience a sense of deep spirituality. Dwarkadhish Temple holds a significant place in Hindu mythology and serves as a vibrant centre of religious and cultural activities, leaving a lasting impression on all who visit.

NAGESHWAR JYOTIRLINGA, DWARKA - A MAJOR SPIRITUAL SITE

Nageshwar Jyotirlinga is an equally important Jyotirlinga as a Kedarnath pilgrimage. It is thought to be the first among India's 12 jyotirlingas. Nageshwar is situated in Saurashtra, Gujarat, near Dwarka. It is said that the devil Daaruka trapped Shiva worshipers, who then began to recite the Shiv chant, causing Shiva to come and destroy the evil.

He decided to live here as a jyotirlinga. A voyage to this place is equally honourable as one to Kedarnath but without the challenges of travelling the rugged rocky terrain. Another major spiritual site near the temple is Gopi Talav Tirth, a lake associated with tales of gopis meeting Lord Krishna and finally surrendering their life to blend with the earth therein.

HUTHEESING JAIN TEMPLE, AHMEDABAD - A PEACEFUL RETREAT


The Hutheesing Jain temple is a peaceful retreat amid Ahmedabad's hectic business district. Lord Dharamnath, the 15th Tirthankara, is the major idol at the temple. There are also 11 more Tirthankaras in the main temple complex,

dynasty, which ruled the state from the eighth to the tenth centuries, before becoming the seat of the Jethwa dynasty. According to historical facts, Rana Bhanji Jethwa lost a battle in 1313 when Sindh's Jadeja Ram Unaji attacked him, and he subsequently fled to Ranpur, leaving Ghumli in ruins.

The temple is 30.48 meters by 45.72 meters in size, with a magnificently sculpted entrance and crafted walls and pillars on both ends. With its beautiful craftsmanship and complicated construction, it rivals the Modhera Sun temple.

SUN TEMPLE, MODHERA - TIMELESS BEAUTY

Modhera's Sun Temple, belonging to Surya Deva, is located 25 km from Mehsana. It was built between 1026 and 1027 AD by King Bhima I of the Chalukyan dynasty. The temple's pillars are artistically carved with images of many divine beings. The shrine has the normal hall, the assembly hall, and the

which is flanked by a courtyard and an arcaded gallery with 52 smaller shrines devoted to other Jain Tirthankaras. Each one is wonderfully carved. In the temple's huge courtyard, there is a tower, known as a Kirti stambh.

Hence, Hutheesing Jain Temple is a white marble iconic landmark embellished with exquisite stone sculptures. This respected property has an excellent layout that includes a garden surrounded by cloisters.

NAVLAKHA TEMPLE, GHUMLI - MAJESTIC CRAFTSMANSHIP

Ghumli is a little village 45 km from Porbandar, in the foothills of Barda. It was the center of the Saindhava

garbha griha, which once held Surya Deva's sculpture but is now absent, and the chamber is shuttered. The assembly hall, unlike some other temples, is a unique structure with its own dome and beautifully carved pillars.

The inner and outer hall domes are each richly carved. Alongside the main temple, there is a big water tank with steps that lead down to the river body in all directions. Mostly along with the steps, there are little shrines devoted to different gods. Furthermore, there is a tiny step well next to the grounds that are currently in disrepair but represents the monarchy of the time with a finely designed mandap. The Uttarardh Mahotsav, a three-day festival, brings the temple to life in the third week of January.

BILESHWAR SHIVA TEMPLE, PORBANDAR - UNLOCK ANCIENT HISTORY WITH FAITH

Bileshwar is a tiny village in the Ranavav taluka of Porbandar, Saurashtra, Gujarat, where Shiva worshipers attend the Bileshwar temple. Lord Krishna is supposed to have concentrated on Lord Shiva for seven months while offering leaves from the Bili tree. Lord Shiva arrived and gave him his request to get the Parijat tree so that he might delight Satyabhama.

The inhabitants have a great belief in Lord Shiva, and festivals are conducted here throughout the month of Shravan and on Shivratri when it is best to head to Bileshwar. Travelling from here to Bagwadar on Khambhalia Road in Porbandar would bring visitors to the Bagwadar Sun Temple, which is remarkable in that it contains nine planet temples around the primary one devoted to the Surya god.

MALLINATH TEMPLE, GIRNAR - INTRICATELY CRAFTED AND ORNAMENTED

Girnar Hill was formerly a haven and refuge for sages and saints seeking peace to reflect. There are both Hindu temples as well as Jain temples here, one of which is the renowned Mallinath temple on Girnar.

This temple is around 600 meters tall and has five peaks, each of which is intricately crafted and ornamented. It takes ninety minutes to ascend 2000 stairs to approach the temple reported to have been erected by Vastupal and Tejpal, who are also attributed to the architecture of the Dilwara temples. There are temples devoted to Lord Neminatha and Amba Devi nearby, and also a Kalika Devi shrine a little further out. Mallinath is regarded as the 19th Tirthankara. He is claimed to have been born into the princely Ikshvaku dynasty but embraced meditation and then became an enlightened being.

BHADRESHWAR JAIN TEMPLE, KUTCH - AN ANCIENT WONDER OF ARCHITECTURAL BRILLIANCE

The Bhadreshwar Vasai Jain temple is situated in the Mundra Taluka of Kutch and is one of the earliest Jain temples worldwide. It is only 69 km from Mandvi, a beautiful beach and port city.

Devchandra, a courtier, built the foundation for this temple, which was later enlarged by King Sidhsen in 449 BC and refurbished by Jagdusha in 1125 AD. According to a few, the temple was built in 516 BC. This temple is similar to the Jain temples of Dilwara, with an 85-foot-by-48-foot courtyard encircled by a gallery of forty-four statues. Ajitnath, the second Tirthankar, is the principal deity, accompanied by Lord Parshwanath and Lord Shantinath. Earthquakes ruined the ancient temples, but each time it was repaired.

The temples of Gujarat stand as remarkable testaments to the religious fervour, architectural brilliance, and cultural richness of the state.

From the awe-inspiring Somnath Temple to the divine Dwarkadhish Temple and the exquisite Akshardham Temple, each temple holds a unique place in the hearts of devotees and admirers.

These sacred sites not only inspire spirituality but also captivate with their intricate carvings, majestic structures, and serene surroundings.



MARWAR FESTIVAL

YOM KIPPUR

The festival of Diwali celebrates with lights and recreates the joyful return of Lord Ram's return to his kingdom, the city of Ayodhya after a period of 14 years of exile.

Sweets are distributed, green crackers and light shows brighten the night skies, homes are decorate with candles and diyas, hand drawn patterns called rangoli welcome families and friends to homes. Prayers are performed as Lakshmi Puja - the Goddess of wealth to bless all with good health and good fortune.





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
