PERFECT BEACHSIDE VACATIONS IN GUJARAT

Dotted with beautiful beaches, Gujarat's shoreline is filled with historical landmarks of the ancient past and the energy of the present

hile tourists usually associate Gujarat with stunning temples, historical landmarks, and a thriving local culture, very few know the state has the longest shoreline among all of India's coastal states. The 1,600-km-long shoreline is dotted with golden beaches, ancient temples, and enchanting flora and fauna.

The underwater marine life is equally alluring, as is the exciting range of leisure activities that the beach destinations offer. This summer, take a break from your usual trip to the mountains and experience the magic of this ancient land.

SHIVRAJPUR AND OKHA MADI BEACHES (DEVBHOOMI DWARKA)

Devbhoomi Dwarka is an ancient town mentioned in the Puranas. Today, however, it makes for an excellent base for sightseeing, pilgrimage, beach activities, and enjoying the diverse marine life. You can reach Dwarka by bus from Jamnagar and Ahmedabad.

Direct train services are also available from some of the major cities of western and southern India. Just 15 minutes away from the famous Rukmini temple is the Shivrajpur beach, one of the blue flag beaches — a long, pristine, sandy beach ideal for long walks. Other must-see places include Okha Madhi, known for its fine sands, Poshitara for its coral

reefs and marine life, and the Charakhla salt pans that attract hundreds of gorgeous flamingos, pelicans, storks, and other variety of birds that migrate every year from the colder climes.

MADHAVPUR BEACH (PORBANDAR)

Situated in Porbandar, the scenic coastal town of Madhavpur is lined with tall coconut trees and ancient temples. Madhavraiji Haveli temple and the crumbling ruins of a 12th-century Shiva temple are two of the major attractions of this region.

Rukmini no Choro comes alive every year with an annual fair hosted by the local Mer community. Porbandar is well-connected with the rest of India through air routes and direct train routes from Ahmedabad, Rajkot, and Junagadh.

TITHAL BEACH (VALSAD)

If you want to experience the remaining vestiges of Portuguese influence, then the union territory of Daman is a great option. Divided into two parts — Moti Daman and Nani Daman — this tourist destination is famous for its churches, beaches, medieval-era forts, and its quaint bylanes filled with houses of colonial influence.

The imposing Moti Daman fort dating back to the 1500s, the impressive Church of Our Lady of the Remedies, and the Fort of St. Jerome are some of the major tourist attractions. But it is the Tithal beach with its striking black sands that







attracts thousands of visitors every year from all parts of Gujarat and beyond. Walk by the seashore, enjoy the gentle sea breeze, and sample the local delicacies of Bhajiya, Dabeli, and Bhel Chaat sold at the sea-side stalls.

MANDVI BEACH (KUTCH)

Once a thriving port of western India, the town of Mandvi is a major tourist attraction today, thanks to its golden sea beaches, and relics of its maritime past. Well-connected by the Bhuj airport and through direct train routes, Mandvi today attracts tourists from far and beyond for its golden sandy beaches and the bustle of the local market selling a delectable variety of local food and souvenir.

PINGLESHWAR BEACH (KUTCH)

The beautiful and serene beach of Pingleshwar lies only seventeen kilometres from the coastal National Highway 8A. Since this is not a much-visited place, the quiet charm of this place will surely give you quite a respite from the hustle and bustle of the city. The nearby bird sanctuary of Nalia and the beautiful wind farms should be on your bucket list when you visit this place.

DUMAS AND SUVALI BEACHES (SURAT)

Located on the southwest side of the city of Surat, the Dumas beach is known for its striking black sands and the famous Dariya Ganesh Temple.

Surat is a major industrial city in this area that is also replete with relics of the ancient past. It is well-connected via rail and air routes with Ahmedabad and Mumbai. Also in Surat, one can find the Suvali beach, where the slippery black sands will make quite an impression.

MAHUVA BEACH (BHAVNAGAR)

Nature and pilgrimage merge in the historically important town of Bhavnagar, where one can find the picturesque



Mahuva beach, which is thronged by Gujarati pilgrims. Well-known for its tranquil waters and breathtaking scenic beauty, this beach is surely going to be a welcome addition to your Gujarat itinerary.

AHMEDPUR MANDAVI (GIR SOMNATH)

Gracing the shoreline of the Arabian Sea, one can find the beach of Ahmedpur Mandavi – one of the lesser-known gems of the state. Adjacent to the island of Diu, the beach merges with Ghogla Beach forming a stunning continuous coastline of above six kilometres.

This is the perfect destination for all the quintessential tourist activities – from curling up with a book on a seaside hammock to watching the dolphins frolic in the waters, from soaking in the sights and sounds of the nearby city of Diu to enjoying water sports.

DANDI BEACH (NAVSARI)

Be a part of an important chapter of our history by visiting Dandi — the famous salt marshes, from where Mahatma Gandhi started his non-violent Satyagraha movement in the 1930s.

Today, however, the Dandi beach is a fabulous tourist destination thanks to its shimmering white beaches and natural beauty. The region is well-connected with the Surat airport and the cities of Mumbai and Ahmedabad.

PIROTAN ISLAND (SAURASHTRA)

Of the 42 islands located across the coastline of Gujarat, Pirotan is the only one that is fully accessible. The island is mostly uninhabited except for a few workers you find working at the lighthouse.

As such, this island makes for a great day trip if you are looking for some solace. The mangrove and the low-tide beaches are home to a wide variety of seabirds and marine creatures.

GAHIRMATHA BEACH, ODISHA


Gahirmatha Beach lies within Odisha's mangrove forests which is a secluded spot on India's East Coast. There are mangrove forests that thrive between the beach and the city which keep the hustle and bustle at bay, This makes

it a soothing and calm place for travellers who can take in the beauty of the sky and sea without being disturbed. The beach is near the Gahirmatha Marine Sanctuary, famous for housing millions of Olive Ridley sea turtles, which is a treat all on its own

BUTTERFLY BEACH, GOA

This is a hidden gem in South Goa and can be visited by taking a ferry from Goa's Palolem and Agonda beaches. This beach is locked by hills and full of beautiful and unique butterflies





hence the name of the beach. Unlike its overcrowded counterparts in Goa, Butterfly Beach is a pristine and solitary little beach. This is the right place for some secluded fun in the warm cerulean waters of the Arabian Sea.

MINICOY ISLAND, LAKSHADWEEP

One of the most beautiful beaches is located on the southernmost and the last Indian island in the Lakshadweep archipelago. This Island is a picturesque island locally referred to as Maliki. The pristine coastline alongside the clear blue waters of the Arabian Sea makes Minicoy a dream island. The depth of water for almost 1-2 km is just 3-4 feet in height so you can have a peaceful walk in the clear blue water without being submerged. There is also a Minicoy Lighthouse on this island where one can enjoy the panoramic view of the sprawling coastline.






EZHIMALA BEACH, KERALA

A serene seaside haven in Kerala which is located around 55 km from Kannur has one of the most beautiful sunsets and sunrise views to die for. The beach also runs alongside the Indian Naval Academy. The little hillock surrounded by the sea is quite secluded and just what everyone dreams of when thinking about relaxing. Mount Deli Lighthouse is another prime attraction in proximity to the beach. One can enjoy the charismatic views of the beach and relax and be one with nature.



OM BEACH, KARNATAKA

Located in the North Canara district of Karnataka, Om Beach takes the shape of an 'Om', a Hindu spiritual symbol so it is considered to be highly auspicious amongst the locals. Om Beach is a photographer's paradise with its amazing early morning and late evening sightseeing delights and observing the amazing transitory phases of the skyline from the shores of Om Beach. Banana boat rides, bumper boat rides, dolphin spotting, jet skiing, fishing, trekking, and speed boating are some adventurous activities you can try here.



MANDARMANI, WEST BENGAL

Mandarmani lies 22 km from Contai, a small town in West Bengal, and is one of the longest drive-in beaches in India at 13 km. With great scenery and clear white sand beaches, Mandarmani is an excellent spot to be far away from the hustle-bustle of everyday life.

You can also find many resorts and hotels in proximity options ranging from budget to premium. Mandarmani Beach is definitely a great place to relax and detox oneself.

JALLANDHAR BEACH, DIU

Jallandhar Beach is a small rocky beach located about 2 km from Diu Bus Station and is a beautiful beach along the coast of the Arabian Sea. It is one of the cleanest and quietest beaches in the country as tourism hasn't eclipsed the local culture here yet.

This beach is less crowded and remains one of the untouched beaches of Diu so It definitely is a haven of beauty, peace, and tranquility. You can spend your time just lazing around on the soft sands.

YARADA BEACH, ANDHRA PRADESH

Yarada Beach is surrounded by beautiful rocky hills which make the beach appear surreal and perfect scenic beauty. It is located 15 km from Visakhapatnam.

Yarada Beach is fringed with many banana and coconut plantations. Since it is not very crowded due to the less infrastructure here, Yarada Beach is by far one of the safest and cleanliest beaches in India at present.





One can relax and look at the waves emerging from the sea along with the calm ambiance of the beach and forget all about the bustling city life. Also, a must-do is to try the local delicious delicacies which are available at the beach.



KASHID BEACH, MAHARASHTRA

Kashid Beach is located along the Konkan belt, about 30 km away from the district of Alibaug. This is a beautiful beach surrounded by granite cliffs that dive into the cerulean waters and weathered boulders that gracefully pander the vast ocean.

Visit this serene beach to be caught spellbound by the last rays of the setting sun that cast a sublime atmosphere on the Arabian Sea. The length of the beach guarantee you'll have no trouble claiming a spot as your own.

LALAJI BAY BEACH, ANDAMAN ISLANDS

Located on the west coast of Long Island, Lalaji Bay beach is one of Andaman Island's most unspoiled beaches with a wide sweep of white sand and surrounded by swaying coconut trees. One needs to take a fiber boat from the Long Island jetty to get to this very beautiful and picturesque beach. Lalaji Bay beach is a fantastic place for adventure junkies. Activities like swimming and snorkeling are the most popular activity here. For lovers of peace, you can chill here, feel the serenity and peacefully watch the waves crashing.





INCREDIBLE TRAIN JOURNEYS ACROSS INDIA

Train journeys in India are always a memorable and fascinating experience.

oing on a train journey, you lose all sense of time as the rhythm of the wheels and the soft sway of the speeding express lull you into another world. You stare in absolute wonder as you watch life passing by through the large windows.

Trains by themselves are such awesome machines. The steam engine with its choo-choo greetings, as the carbon particles, float in the air, and the powerhouse electric train is living its glory days. Slowly and steadily the Vande express is carving out the path for modern bullet trains to make their way to India.

A specialty of India's rail journeys is that the Indian Railways system occupies a special place within the national heritage spectrum of India. You can count yourself as absolutely fortunate to experience the unimaginable as Indian Railways presents four UNESCO World Heritage Sites namely Darjeeling Himalayan Railway (1999), Nilgiri Mountain

Railway (2005), Kalka Shimla Railway (2008), and Chhatrapati Shivaji Terminus, Mumbai (2004) with Matheran Light Railway and Kangra Valley Railway awaiting recognition.

Before you step onto your unique train journey remember that Indian Railways presents its heritage through 34 Museums, Heritage Parks, and Heritage galleries, spread all over India. And yes, they are definitely worth a visit as the Railways have preserved 230 Steam Locomotives, 110 vintage coaches, and wagons at these museums and heritage parks. Interestingly, some of these rolling stocks are more than 100 years old.

Here are some legendary train experiences you must have on your bucket list:

MAHARAJA EXPRESS

Here is a luxury train experience that is all about cultural showcasing of destinations and presenting a true royal 'Maharaja' experience. Life on the train is all about opulence,

and a genteel ambiance. All guest cabins and salons offer optimum comfort and luxury.

Passengers are welcomed with garlands and flower petals showered over them. The service delivered on the train is nothing short of treating the traveller as 'Royalty'.

Anyone riding the train would feel special for the 6 Night - 7 days trip which starts in Delhi and passes through Ranthambore, Jaipur, Bikaner, Jodhpur, Udaipur, and ends in Mumbai. A majority of the destinations that the Maharaja Express passes through are true to its name - the Maharaja Express. Rajasthan is a land of royalty with beautiful forts, palaces, and havelis.

This luxury train also provides the guest with a variety of delectable cuisines presented in two dining cars over a silver-plated service.

KONKAN RAILWAYS (MANDOVI EXPRESS)

This has to be one of the most delightful journeys by train, as the train journeys past rugged mountains, lush valleys, sunlit

paddy fields, bustling villages, and glistening rivers that lead out to sea.

The journey is 738 km long through the states of Maharashtra, Goa, and Karnataka. During the monsoon, the rains grace and purify the already lush green landscape.

The first part of the journey is from Mumbai to Goa. Enjoy one day in Goa and then board the train to continue your journey to Mangaluru.

Visit the Battery watchtower and Kadri temple, and rest for one day. Next, it's the final stretch of the journey ending in Kerela. Take your first steps in Kochi, a delightful coastal city. Visit the Periyar National Park and take a backwater cruise on houseboats in Alleppey.

BOAT MAIL EXPRESS

This amazing train journey from Chennai to Rameswaram crosses one of the country's engineering marvels. The major highlight of this train is the way it crosses the blue sea. The Pamban bridge connects the mainland to Rameshwaram



Island. The gentle sea breeze and the aquamarine landscape are enchanting. There is also hope the bridge might be a UNESCO world heritage site which it truly deserves to be.

Why was it called the boat mail? Because far back in 1914, the passengers changed over to a boat ferry from the Indian end of the route in order to cross the seas to Sri Lanka.

When in Rameshwaram don't forget to visit Dhanush Koti where the three seas meet. Strong winds blow, and you can feel the waves massage your legs. The view is a reminder of Edward Newgate's quote "everyone is a child of the sea".


HIMALAYAN QUEEN

This winsome journey on the pretty little gauge crosses 305kms as it snakes its way through 102 tunnels, 900 curves, and 87 bridges runs on the Delhi and Kalka track at the foothills of the Himalayas. UNESCO added the Kalka–Shimla railway to the mountain railways of India World Heritage Site. It was built in 1903 when English Ladies had to escape the summer heat.

The journey is quaint as it can sometimes be brought to a halt by cows wandering near the tracks, and it's time to take a break for tea and pakoras under the tall trees and shady cool passages. Watch the beautiful scenery unfolding before you - apple orchards and pine forests as the green landscape and blue sky fills you up with joy.

DARJEELING TOY TRAIN

The toy train is a UNESCO world heritage site, built in the 1800s, and holds a lot of historical value. Imagine taking a journey on an 1881 narrow gauge line, where some of the original steam trains still run from Darjeeling to Ghoom. At an

altitude of 7400 feet, Ghoom has the distinction of being the highest train station in India.

Charmingly slow and quaintly steady wins the race. Going slow has its charm, and you find yourself enjoying the journey even more. The train moves at a slow speed allowing you to see the peaceful sleepy villages, plantation workers plucking leaves in the tea garden.

The best part though is it makes a 10-minute halt as it spirals around a gorgeous garden at Batasia loop, which has a series of switchbacks. The train crosses 450 bridges, as it climbs

steeply towards Ghoom. You can also get majestic views of the famous Kanchenjunga mountain snow-covered peak.

NILGIRI MOUNTAIN RAILWAY

One of India's most fascinating train journeys which recreates the nostalgia of train travel is clearly travelling in a steam engine locomotive on a track that is also a UNESCO world heritage site. Covering a distance of 46 km, the train journey starts from Mettupalayam to scenic spots like Ooty and Coonoor.

This is the only rack railway in India that runs from Mettupalayam to Ooty scaling an elevation of 326m to 2203m in a time span of five hours and reminds you of the marvels of engineering long ago over extremely challenging mountainous terrain.

Enjoy breathtaking views of valleys, as the journey to my mind, can be nicknamed 'a cloud express'. Immerse yourself in this magnificent experience as the 1000mm meter-gauge railway slowly ascends the Nilgiri hills through 16 tunnels, 250 bridges, and 208 curves chugging through panoramic scenery of lush green meadows, big blue rivers, and high forest reserves.

This train is also popular as the location shoot of one of Bollywood's most successful films and was the stage for one

of the most iconic songs, with famous stars Shah Rukh Khan and Malaika dancing on the roof of this train to the song 'chaiya chaiya'.

KASHMIR VALLEY TRAIN

A train journey across Kashmir is surreal; it can't be put into words. The cold bites but the enchanting landscape warm the heart. The journey from Jammu to Baramulla is one of the most challenging railways projects and built-in earthquake-prone zones. The rewards are blissful as you cross mountain passes, undulating meadows and valleys, and the beautiful Aharball waterfall.

The Banihal-Baramulla Railway line in the centre of the Kashmir Valley runs through a 119 km broad gauge rail route through the most beautiful scenery that makes the paradise that is Kashmir.

A memorable experience takes shape when the train goes through India's longest railway tunnel (11.2 km long) and suddenly the dark gives way as the train emerges to the wonderous crossing of the Pir-Panjal Range to touch Qazigund. Feast your eyes and your cameras on the crystal clear scenery of vast mountain ranges and green meadows, white and blue streams, and the local shepherds or 'Bakarwals' grazing their sheep.



radled in the lap of the mighty Himalayas, Himachal Pradesh is a trekkers' paradise. Its green, cloud-filled valleys surrounded by snow-clad mountains offer a myriad of scenic trails.

Quintessential streams running by the apple orchards charm the trekker. Blue skies stretch over towering high deodar trees, traditional Himachali villages and fluffy white clouds nestle in valleys and mountain tops ... what a paradise to trek through and what a memorable experience you can take away with you.

For years now, Himachal has been attracting trekkers from all around the world. With that said, there are still numerous trails that sit in solitude yet to be explored. If you are someone who has a taste for untouched natural trails, away from the crowd, these trails are just for you.

GRAHAN VILLAGE TREK

This 12kms trek from Kasol to Grahan Village, which is located at a height of 2,347 m in Parvati Valley, is a trek straight out of

a fairy tale book. It is an easy forest trail that moves alongside the Grahan Nallah (stream), which is a beautiful sight on its own


It takes around 5 hours to reach the village. And only towards the end of the trail comes the difficult uphill part, which is rewarded by the spectacular vista of mountains as you enter the village. Grahan is mystical and is closely related to Malana and its legend.

Unlike Kasol, Graham remains untouched, tucked away in nature. The village has got no cellular network which gives the feeling of going back in time. There are around 50 houses in total with some being 200 years old. So, if you are someone looking for solitude, away from the crowd, this could be your special place to unwind.

RASOL VILLAGE TREK

Located high up in the mountain top of Parvati Valley is this small hamlet village of Rasol. It is located at a height of 3,048 m and the trail is mostly uphill. The trek starts from the





nearby village of Chalal and takes you up a steep mountain covered by red and pink rhododendron trees. It is a moderate trek and takes about 5-6 hours to reach the top. On reaching the top, one can see the majestic view of Sar Pass and Khali Pass.

DEV ROOPA TREK

One of the most off-beat treks of Himachal is the trek to the mystical meadows of Dev Roopa. Visited by a few and described as a heaven on Earth, Dev Roopa gives you an unearthly feeling.



It is a vast grassland with meandering streams running through the meadow. This trail would even make you camp out with shepherds. The trek begins from the famous Malana Village, known to be the descendants of the famous warrior, Alexander the Great. It then leads to the Rhododendron laid trail of Waichin Valley, and finally after 3 to 4 days of trekking, one can witness the magic of Dev Roopa. Located at a height of 4,100 m, at the foot of the Tiger Hills, Dev Roopa will leave you speechless.

PATALSU PEAK TREK

Located at a height of 4,220 meters in Kullu Valley, Patalsu Peak is a perfect summit trek for a novice trekker. It is an easy-moderate trek and ideal for trekkers preparing for summit climbs.

The trail starts from Solang Valley and takes you through the alpine forests and lush green meadows of the valley. From the summit, one can get a panoramic view of the beautiful Kullu valley and majestic peaks like Hanuman Tibba, Friendship Peak, etc. The accessibility, ease of climb, and breathtaking views from the top make it the perfect beginners' summit trek.





KARERI LAKE TREK

Kareri Lake Trek is located at a height of roughly 2,950 m in Himachal Pradesh's Kangra region. The Lake here is a result of the flowing water bodies from the Minkiani peak and is surrounded by mountains and alpine forests. The journey to Kareri Lake is one of Himachal Pradesh's most stunning alpine hikes, passing through verdant meadows and multiple rushing streams.



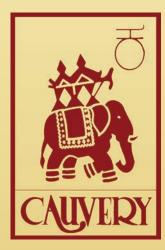






TRADITIONAL GOAN WEDDINGS TO LIGHT UP ROMANCE

A Goan wedding is a full-fledged event with a wide range of authentic traditional ceremonies and customs.


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RITUALS

The bride wears as many bangles as she can in a Goan wedding called 'Chuddo' which is a celebration be it a Hindu or a Christian ceremony. This custom is intimately linked to Goan culture, as the people place a high value on bridal accessories during weddings. Chuddo are gorgeous bangles that are particularly fashioned in a specific colour and size. Additionally, the colour and size of the bangles vary by the village. These glass bangles are exceedingly fragile and are obtained from the 'Volar,' a local bangle merchant in the area.

Following the Chuddo ceremony, the 'Ros' ceremony is performed, in which the bride and groom are coated with







fresh coconut milk. This is a pre-wedding ceremony that takes place two to three days before the wedding. The bride and groom's parents, as well as their friends, relatives, and other guests, execute the ceremony at their respective homes.

The custom of pouring coconut milk over the bride and groom before the wedding is meant to purify or purify the marriage, and it simply symbolises a new life filled with happiness and success.

A lunch known as 'Bicareanchem Jevonn' is held in honour of the house's departed souls. An elder member of the household cracks a coconut in front of the house before the cooking of this dinner begins.

This lunch's highlight is a spicy, aromatic dry prawn curry called 'samarachi koddi,' which is made with dry, unripe salted mango (mango sol). Rice 'Voddes' and urid dal are also available.

Soji, a sweet consisting of wheat and sugar cooked in coconut juice, and 'Vonn,' a sweet made of gramme dal, coconut juice, and jaggery, are also available. This dinner includes unique paddy that has been boiled, as well as zotis'.

On the wedding day, a groom's close relative who is meant to assist the bride in getting ready arrives at her home with the bridal gown and other accessories. All close family and friends bless the bride and groom in their own homes before coming to the chapel.

After the groom arrives at the church, the wedding car arrives to pick up the bride. The couple says their wedding

vows here, and the priest then pronounces them husband and wife. Following this, the newlywed arrives at the groom's residence, where the groom's mother slips a gold chain around the bride's neck and the 'saddo' on her shoulder.

They then continue to the celebration venue, where the wedding cake is cut and food and drinks are provided, as well as dancing and celebrations.

A toast is also made for the married couple's happiness and success. This Goan wedding custom is usually carried out after the wedding. The Xim refers to a boundary marked by the pouring of liquor. The brides, and therefore the groom's family, would stand on either side of this line, offering prayers, reciting sacred scriptures, and showering blessings on the newlyweds. Also, to put an end to all of the family feuds and return home happy.

The bride's family may make a few sweet items at the groom's residence to distribute among family, relatives, and locals as vojje. After that, some of it is restored to the bride's family. The Goan sweet "Boll," Doce, and a Banana are all included in the Vojje. Other goodies are distributed as well. The Vojje is given to the village and family as a show of appreciation for their help during the wedding preparations.

The Appoune or Porthopon follows the wedding ceremony.

The bride's family normally invites the groom's family over to their house the day after the wedding ceremony or reception, according to this tradition.





A large feast is prepared for the bride, who wears a brilliant red saree or outfit known as Saddo. Both families have the opportunity to interact in a more informal and comfortable environment while getting to know one another better.

WEDDING ATTIRE

The groom is usually dressed in a formal suit Black or white suit typically accompanying the wedding theme. He's dressed in a white shirt with a boutonniere on his jacket's left lapel.

For brides in Goa, the traditional gown is a virgin-white gown. Catholic women wear expensive garments to their white weddings. Non-Catholic brides, on the other side, dress in a traditional lehenga or a 9-yard sari known as the Pano Bhaju for Indian-style weddings.

For a Catholic wedding, grooms wear a western-style suit, but for an Indian wedding, they wear a kurta. Traditionally women wear fota, a piece of jewellery worn on the head, neck, arms, and ears, as ornaments. A green stone was sandwiched between two corals in Fator, a double-chained adornment. The wedding necklace is traditionally called Cordao, and the traditional bangles are called nille.

GOAN WEDDING CUISINE

Goan cuisine is a fascinating blend of influences, and it is unquestionably one of India's most evolved cuisines. A Goan wedding will typically have a gastronomic feast laid out for guests which will include most of the following delicious dishes:

- Goan masala fried fish fingers These are boneless fish fillets that have been finger-shaped and wrapped in Goan spices before being fried until crispy. They are served hot.
- Fried prawns with a crispy coating These are tail-on prawns that have been spiced with spicy home-style masala and stir-fried in coconut oil.
- Goan fish curry- Indian salmon is simmered in a coconut-based stew in this meal.
- Boiled rice This dish consists of rice that has been parboiled and is served steaming hot with curry.
- Grilled Pork Chops This meal consists of marinated pork ribs that have been barbecued.





- Pork Sorpotel with Sannas Served with sannas, a spicy stew with hog flesh, liver, and kidney.
- Prawn and Rice Salad In a salad, tiny freshwater catch prawns are combined with parboiled rice.
- Lobster Salad Freshwater lobster is filled with a cheesy prawn combination and served with fenny.
- Cocada A traditional Goan dessert made with coconut and poppy seeds.
- Bibinka A traditional dessert made with coconut milk and eggs topped with palm sugar.

he historic shopping bazaars of India are a wonderful representation of a golden historic era where everything from priceless jewels to famous spices to grain and cloth was bought and sold by nobles and royalty as much as the common men and women of the day.

Today much of the same charm is imbued in the colourful canopied stalls and ancient shops with legendary names and reputations of their trade. The traditions and the infrastructure of these bazaars and their valuables are still carried forward in much the same way as it was presented in olden times - and that is the wonderful joy de verve of these quaint bustling historic bazaars of India.

It is amazing how these historic bazaars give us a glimpse of our glorious past - recreated every time we visit them in diverse regions of our country.

LET'S REVISIT THE 10 MOST ICONIC HISTORICAL BAZAARS OF INDIA.

CHANDNI CHOWK, DELHI

With an ancestry tracing back to the 17th century, this historic bazaar was a favourite of the Mughal Emperor Jahangir and his daughter Jahanara. The entire shopping area is clustered with colourful shops that were once a favoured outing and recreation palace of the Mughals. The rich architecture, colourful facades, fragrances of street foods, ancient and regal havelis, shrines, the decor of the shops, mansions, etc. give you the perfect vibe of ancient times that is paradoxically juxtaposed within a contemporary era.

With the endless collections of shops of different kinds such as traditional clothes, jewellery, wedding paraphernalia,



perfumes, spices, antiques, souvenirs, and some delicious food, your entire day will be occupied and you won't even realise it. For all the spice lovers you should definitely visit the Khari Baoli wholesale market.

This old Delhi charm can be enjoyed by rickshaw ride as it will help you cover every nook and corner of the place. Do not forget to visit the famous eateries of Chandni Chowk - which have earned global fame among gourmet food lovers. Try the chaat, the parathas in the Paratha wale gully, the famous Jalebis in asli ghee, Rabri, and the mouth-watering poori - alloo and much much more.

JEW TOWN, KOCHI

This market in the Mattancherry area of Kochi traces its history all the way back to the sixteenth century. The bazaar is replete with Portuguese-style structures and narrow roads, lined by shops that offer everything from trinkets to collectibles, local crafts, fragrances, gems, and spices. The exotic fragrance of pepper, chillies, cloves, and cardamom fill the spice street which has warehouses storing these spices.

A considerable number of the retailers likewise come from a long tradition of Jewish families who have lived here for ages and are entirely familiar with the history and living cultural mores of the local people.

Jew Town is a historic jewel famous for its 16th-century Paradesi Synagogue and was once the hub of commerce in the former thriving Jewish neighbourhood.

Well known for its old-world ambiance with traditional shops lining the narrow lanes of Synagogue Lane and Jew Town Road, you can buy anything from carved wood collectibles and vessels to locally crafted curios and sculptures, as well as unusual handmade toys. Every one of the shops here contains wonderful buys with peculiar and intriguing stories.

One experience you must not miss while shopping is a look at a prized antique - a big vaarpu (a large bronze vessel with handles) that is three metres in diameter. Another big attraction next to the Paradesi synagogue in Mattanchery is a 1760 clock tower that sports four faces with numerals in Latin, Hebrew, and Malayalam. It was built by Ezekiel Rahabi, a Jewish businessman.

The quarter is full of quaint cafes and al-fresco eateries which serve up local gourmet fare. This remarkable bazaar knits so many parts of history and goes about living their ancient ways as they gift memories and wonderful experiences to visitors.

NEW MARKET, KOLKATA

Kolkata is definitely a place that people love to shop at, as this lovely city is known for its cultural and historical ambiance and legacy. One such place that embodies the history of Kolkata is New Market on Lindsay street which was established in 1874. The massive arcade of the grand Victorian-Gothic architecture is an emblem of the New Market and has survived two large fires that have taken place here. The red brick clock tower is a landmark that towers above the sprawling maze of shops that stretch in a labyrinth of stalls and arcades.





Formerly known as the Sir Stuart Hogg Market, this chaotic, crowded yet colourful place is home to about 2000 stalls and shops that come under one roof. If you have great bargaining skills you can definitely shop at great prices or take the help of the coolie dada who will give you all the tiny details of which shops specialize in which item and at the right price.

The market is a lively hub of everything you may want to buy - famous street foods, exotic flowers, utensils, leather bags, electronics, clothing, expensive jewelry, fresh fruit, seafood, etc.

Don't miss the ethnic Tibetan shop Chhamba Lama, which sells Tibetan jewelry and artifacts. You can treat yourself to some marzipan and fruitcake at Nahoum and sons, which is one of the oldest shops in the market. Step out for a while



and take in the old bookstores like Modern Book Depot, Piccadilly Book Shop, or Bengal Book Stores which stock rare titles and are the oldest dealers of second-hand books. Finally pick some exotic fresh vegetables like avocados, Chinese cabbage, and fresh herbs at Stall 80 in Block N of New Market!

LAAD BAZAAR, HYDERABAD

This crowded place is set in a narrow alley, where no vehicle is allowed. This well-known historical place is situated near Hyderabad's famous Charminar. It is said that the market has been there since the Qutub Shahis and the Nizams period and consequently presents a living legacy of the city.

There are many stories as to how it derived its name, interestingly the meaning of Laad bazaar is lacquer. Lacquer is one of the significant materials used to make bangles studded with stones; these ethic lac bangles are a popular buy among guests. Imagine a one-kilometer long strip with shops selling every kind of bangle... glass bangles, studded bangles, Laquer bangles, silver bangles, gold bangles, semi-precious stone studded bangles, and expensive wedding accessories.

The heritage bazaar has a wonderful traditional ambiance - the narrow lane is dotted with shops, stalls, hanging wooden balconies, and old buildings of historical splendour where lively bargaining and haggling is a vibrant part of the shopping experience.

The market also offers several exquisite items such as sarees, perfumes, silverware, and famous pearl jewellery. The most famous buys include traditional master crafts like silverware, Bidri ware, Nirmal, Kalamkari paintings, hand woven fabrics for weddings like velvet, brocade, and gold embroidered tunics, sherwanis, traditional Khara Dupattas in silk and cotton, and traditional perfumes in glass bottles called ittar.

IMA KEITHEL, IMPHAL

A traditional bazaar that is entirely run by women, the renowned Ima Keithel market traces its origins back to the 17th century and is popularly known as the mother's market. It is situated in the capital city of Manipur, Imphal, and is probably the largest all-women market in Asia.

This unusual all ladies' market has 5000 "Imas" or moms who run the shops and stalls. What an amazing experience it is to see a bustling legendary market with only women selling wares, colorfully dressed in the local phaneks (sarong) and innaphis (shawls), and confidently reaching out to hundreds of customers who come to this veritable shoppers paradise. The 500-year-old market has been a significant exchange market of the state and keeps on drawing countless shoppers. As history has it, the bazaar's all-ladies force began after the Lallup-Kaba, an old forced labour framework, where men were away in forced labour and women had no other resource except to start these small shops to feed their families.



Over the years this evolved into a thriving marketplace that is now housed in three pagoda-styled buildings. This traditional bazaar is not merely a thriving market – but remains a symbol of Manipur's cultural identity and recognition of women as a successful workforce.

The bazaar is divided rather well into two buildings on either side of the road with wholesale products and food items like groceries, fish, vegetables, and organic products like the famous Morok chilli housed in one building and handicraft and traditional handloom material and household requirements in the other building. Close by shoppers can buy fine baskets and wicker works.

DEVARAJA MARKET, MYSORE

If you want to picture the life of Mysore then you must visit the streets of Devaraja market with their picturesque clock towers. This is the most iconic bazaar of Mysore that dates back to the time of Tipu Sultan.

This unique heritage bazaar lies in the central Sayyaji Rao road of Mysore and was expanded by Chmaraja Wodeyar IX in the late 1800s. At present, the bazaar is spread over 3 acres of land with 800 shops that are established over time. There are several entrances to the structure that houses the bazaar and shops are to be found along three aisles that run right through the market.

This legendary bazaar has so much to offer, and shoppers can find anything from a wholesale flower market with dozens of shops selling exotic flowers, marigolds, jasmine, and roses and making garlands for shoppers, to a wholesale fruit and vegetable market with over 40 different kinds of fruit and an endless supply of vegetables to a spice market with everything from mounds of turmeric to chilli and fresh herbs.

Shops sell silks, sandalwood, red kumkum powder, incense, and green betel leaves to everyday household items in their own allotted section. Do not forget the famous sweet shops at the outer rings of the bazaar and grab a bite of the famous Mysore Pak.

FLEA MARKET, GOA

If you want the flavour of a traditional Goan market that has its own twist on what an open-air shopping hub should be, you must visit the legendary bazaars or flea markets of Goa. They date back to the 1980s when they began as "hippie trade spots" where foreign travellers sold off their assets from time to time.

The most colourful historical bazaar is the Anjuna market which is truly a melting pot of European, and Indian ethnic goods with a strong Gujarati touch as tribal women sell a mixed bag of garments of every kind. These include scarves, wraps, shirts, and T-shirts to colorful sarees, sweaters, and bags.

In this cultural milieu, tourists will find some unusual artifacts as sellers from Kashmir present rugs and carpets, kaftans, shawls, and wood and brass handicrafts. Sculptures and curios are sold from ethnic Tibetan stalls as are bedspreads, saris, quilts, and puppets from Rajasthani traders. A fascinating addition is spice, handicrafts, and clothing sold by shopkeepers from Kerala and Karnataka.

Another seasoned market is situated at Arpor. Ingo's is an absolute flower child heaven with quaint stores and Indians and foreigners selling garments, hats, food, souvenirs, sarongs, seashells, handicrafts, leather products. and antique items as local bands and artists play for you.

While you shop anywhere in these local and traditional markets and bazaars, ensure you additionally bring your haggling game to the market.

JOHARI BAZAAR, JAIPUR

Known as a shoppers' paradise, this historic market lies in the Pink city of Jaipur. Johari Bazaar as the name suggests is a market for gems and jewellery. Shoppers will discover a colonnaded street coloured in orange, pink, and rose. You will find a long line of shops belonging to a well-established lineage of traditional jewellers who can trace several generations devoted to the buying and selling of jewels and



the fine art of jewellery craftsmanship. Shoppers will be awed looking at the array of vibrant coloured stones, precious and semi-precious stones, diamonds, emeralds, and topaz that are used in making jewellery.

There is so much to explore in the ancient market of Johari Bazar, as you move towards the east you will spot shops selling metal antiques. You can also visit the Maniharon ka Raasta, off Tripolia Bazaar, where you can witness the lac bangle-makers at work. To find traditional jute and wood cots, silver items and other local handicrafts do pay a visit to the Kishanpol Bazaar. Shoppers will find a wonderful selection of locally made Mojri Shoes, Souvenirs, handicrafts, Rajasthani fabric like bandhani work, and block-printed textiles.

For all the sweet lovers you must stop by the Laxmi Mishthan Bhandar.

CHOR BAZAAR, MUMBAI

The famous Chor Bazaar is one of the biggest flea markets in the nation and has been the city's go-to for collectibles and a plethora of shopping goods for well over a century. Chor Bazaar didn't begin with its present name. The 150-year old market was once known as Shor Bazaar, referring to the boisterous merchants in the souk who had settled along the little paths of this area.

Located on Mutton Street, Chor bazaar has a traditional old-world charm with Mughul architecture dominating the old buildings with their crowded alleys and crammed shops. Today this colourful local bazaar offers everything from spare auto parts, to retro Bollywood banners and one-of-a-kind boom boxes, to antiques and Victorian furniture to electronics, second-hand gym equipment and salvaged material of every kind.

Because of its endless array of goods, the market stays a famous tourist location. Notwithstanding, quite a bit of its shoppers come from the city itself. Bollywood regularly sources its props from the Bazaar's main shops. From lights to utilized vehicle parts, there's nothing you can't find in Mumbai's historic bazaar.

AMINABAD MARKET, LUCKNOW

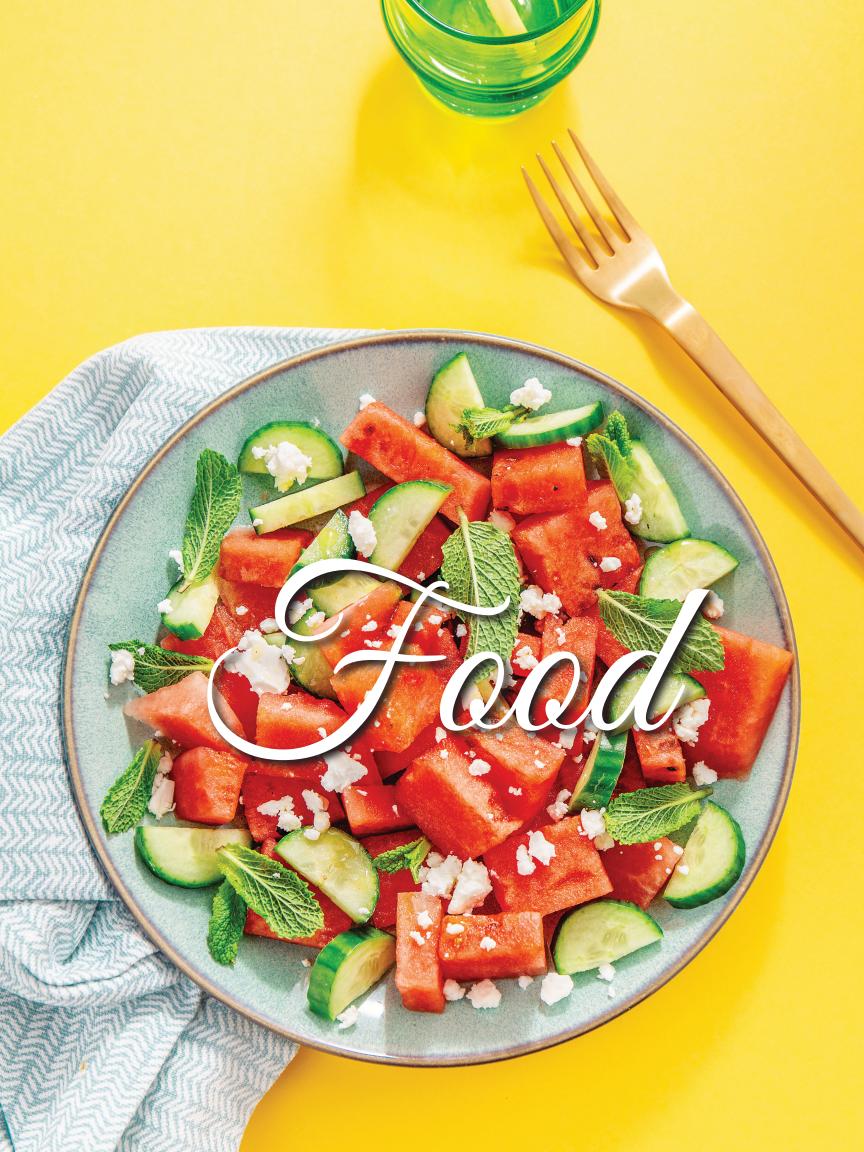



Shopping in Aminabad Market includes a stop at Wahid Biryani for a delicious meal. There are a variety of food stalls and cafés serving street food and other savouries. The renowned Prakash Kulfi and Tunday Kababi are a must-try for all food lovers.









VERY VERY VEGAN!

India is a haven for vegetarian lovers. Many might think that vegetarian food only involves Paneer, Pulses, and some vegetable.

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hat is not the case, there are vegetarian dishes that involve ingredients that are very indigenous to small towns and states.

To experience the incredible range of vegetarian cuisine one has to travel to every corner of the country. North Indian dishes involve lots of different vegetables, while coconut dishes are generally popular in Southern and coastal states.

You can get an idea of how extensive Indian vegetarian food can be from the fact that India has the largest number of vegetarians in the world. So fingerlicking vegetarian food has to be a pre-requisite if we are talking about vegetarian dishes in India.

Vegetarianism is an ancient philosophy in India on account of its Vedic traditions and Ayurvedic principles of healing food which is largely based on vegetarian fare as far back as 4000 BC. The nonviolence philosophy reinforced by Buddhism and Jainism which abhors taking of animal life was further developed by herbal medicine systems which emphasised plants and herbs as healing food.

It is also a fact that many Indian religious festivals encourage fasting and permit the intake of vegetarian food. In addition, the number of pulses, vegetables, and grains grown in India is phenomenal and has led to an extensive and brilliant range of vegetarian dishes.

We share popular vegetarian dishes which are a favourite with the locals which in turn infuse wonderful flavours and tastes into these remarkable preparations.

RAJMA CHAWAL, CHOLE CHAWAL, CURRY CHAWAL (DELHI)

An amalgamation of various cultures. the region of Delhi NCR has a vast range of delicious and popular dishes made with pulses and grain dishes. Rajma Chawal, (Kidney Beans, with rice), Chole Chawal (Chickpea with rice), and Curry Chawal, (A yellow spicy gravy with rice) are a staple and favoured dishes of the region.

These sought-after preparations make for a filling meal and are usually eaten for lunch or dinner. It is not necessary for the dish to be eaten with rice. You can enjoy the gravy lentil dish with Chapatis and Puris also.



ULAVACHARU (ANDHRA PRADESH)

One of the tastiest and celebrated dishes of Andhra Pradesh and Telangana, Ulavacharu is a thick, earthy coloured curry produced using horse gram and has a hearty, sweet-acrid taste.

It's cooked during special events, presented with a touch of cream, and eaten with rice. It looks like chocolate sauce, in appearance, but don't be mistaken!

This wonderful comfort food for the soul takes time to prepare as it is best prepared by slow cooking the horse gram over several hours, then ground to a paste, and then blended with onions, garlic, tamarind, spices like cumin, to make a curry.

The curry is often soaked and cooked with rice and the awesome flavours make for a great vegetarian biryani. The Spicy Venue—a surprisingly decent eatery for veggie lovers—make extraordinary ulavacharu.



VADA/ SAMBHAR (TAMIL NADU)

One of the best snacks in the state or country, vada is a savoury doughnut made from ground pulses and deep-fried. The crispiness of the Vada and the rich taste of Sambhar (a spicy stew of pigeon pea and tamarind, lentils, and vegetables) is just out of this world. Make sure you have your crisp vada while it is hot, else it turns very chewy and loses its outer crunchiness. Enjoy it with a slightly spicy Sambhar which gives you a relaxing evening.




AVIAL (KERELA)

This is a gently enhanced dish of blended vegetables cooked with curd and coconut, and is made either with a thin or thick sauce. Avial is one of the dishes which is an essential component of customary Kerala 'sadhya' or vegan meal and is eaten with rice. Fresh and light, this is the ideal dish to eat in the warm and wet Kerala climate. Fun fact: There is an Indian band named Avial, so feel free to listen to it too.



DAAL BAATI (RAJASTHAN)

This is a basic dish, which is exceptionally fulfilling, with the ghee giving it an additional richness that brings the flavours to a new high. This is one of the numerous North Indian veg dishes that doesn't get its due. A principal staple of Rajasthani food, dal baati is a straightforward dish of heated wholewheat mixture balls presented with yellow dal (lentils). The new baati is broken into little pieces before being blended in with ghee and dal and eaten afterward.



JALEBI (NORTH INDIA, AND ESPECIALLY GUJARAT)

Crisp, dipped in a sweet treacle, jalebis are quite possibly the most famous Indian veggie lover dessert ever.

These famous sweet, crunchy twistings are, obviously, available all over India. In any case, in Gujarat, where they're generally had for breakfast, they've been taken to another level altogether. They're generally eaten with the exquisite fafda, which tones down the outrageous sweetness of the jalebis. You can also dip your Jalebis in cold milk which is an outstanding combination.





AMADO CURRY (GOA)

Amado, likewise called amade or ambade (hoard plum in English), is a hard, light natural product that looks similar to a little unripe mango. This natural product is cooked in a light and tart curry, which is made at home. Try not to be astounded if you can't nibble through the entire organic product, however. Just the external tissue is palatable, even though the entire natural product is cooked in the curry. The rest is a bit like a hard wipe, which you can bite assuming you need a greater amount of its tangy juice.

MISAL PAV (MAHARASHTRA)

Technically, misal pav is a tidbit and not a feast. In any case, it's fantastic enough for there not to be a lot of contrast. Famous street food across Maharashtra, missal is a combination of bean sprout curry, spiced bubbled potatoes, and quite a few crunchy seared tidbits covered with flimsy, zesty sauce and sprinkled with slashed onions. It is presented with pav—little square portions of bread. In Maharashtra specifically Mumbai you can also enjoy Vada Pav, which is a spicy potato patty served with a bun, and Pav Bhaji which is also a very tasty dish.





THUKPA (HIMACHAL PRADESH)

Thukpa is a warm, satisfying soupy dish of broth, noodles, and vegetables, and is a meal on its own—which we found perfect for the cold summers and freezing winters of Ladakh.

Since Ladakh shares borders with Tibet, it is natural to have Tibetan influence in the land. Beware, though: Thukpa has many non-vegetarian versions as well, so be careful when you order. It's also a little messy to eat, so don't worry if you're splashing soup all over while slurping your noodles.

SOKOTO (WEST BENGAL)

Bengali cuisine is diverse, but Sooktho takes a new turn as it traces its origins to a Portuguese dish. Sooktho is a delectable gem of a dish and while it is a simple mixed vegetable dish just like chochodi, but with white gravy, the five spices or paanch phoron, ginger, chillies in mustard oil lend it an exquisite warmth.

The dish is very light, perfect for the hot weather, and healthy for the body too. The broth is simple but very tasty. Even with fewer spices, the light dish is perfect for the weather.



DELICIOUS MEAT DISHES AND THEIR ORIGIN

Non-vegetarian or meat dishes have a very dear relationship with food lovers. Over the ages, chefs and gourmets of good food have developed and improvised creating scrumptious, mouth-watering meat dishes.

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he first bite into a juicy, and tender meat fills you with satisfaction. The bombarding flavour makes your vision go dark, the mind just takes in all of the flavours sending a dopamine rush. You take the next bite and go on and get depressed when you finished the whole thing. You take a look at your wallet to check if you can buy one more, and then enjoy some more.

a chicken variation. It was the food of the Nizams and the Mughals, which is now enjoyed by the country. A plate of this aromatic dish would cost around Rs 20-30.

Hyderabadi dum biryani is a bombardment of flavours that becomes more complex with saalan (a spicy gravy). Many people come to Andhra Pradesh to delve into the authentic taste of Hyderbad Dum Biryani. The speciality of this biryani





is that while cooking it, the process of layering is adopted. There will be a layer of the mutton/chicken and then a layer of rice.

LAAL MAAS (RAJASTHAN)

Laal Maas is a very famous mutton dish from Rajasthan. It is a mutton curry with lots of hot chillis and spices in it. It is served with bajra roti is in general but you can have it with plain rice. So assuming you need something zesty in non-veg with Indian style in it, at that point, you should evaluate Laal Maas without a doubt. However, you must be a bit cautious with regards to the searing taste.

You can also try a spicier version of the Laal Maas which is called Jungli Maas. Prepare to cry out because of the hot spiciness.



FISH RECHEADO (GOA)

If you admire the taste of fish and need to taste a famous Goan delicacy then Fish Recheado is an excellent choice. It is a zesty and crunchy fish from Goa. By and large, ocean fishes




are used to make it. Ocean fish traditionally have a salty taste to them, so people who eat freshwater fish may take time to acquire the taste. Normally this dish is dry but some variations include gravy which allows it to be eaten with Rice/ Chappati.

TUNDAY KABABS (UTTAR PRADESH, LUCKNOW)

Tunday kabab is a very famous dish from Lucknow in India. It is an old dish which goes back 100 years. It is named after the creator of this mouth-melting dish, a man named Murad Ali who lost his arm flying a kite. A handicapped person is called 'tunday'. This is the most well-known kabab in India that you can dig into. It is available in practically all the kebab shops which can be found in the streets of Lucknow.





BHAPA ILISH (WEST BENGAL)

The best place to eat would be in their home state which is Himachal Pradesh. Under the starry sky, shivering from cold, a bowl of thukpa is the best meal before ending your day.


BUTTER CHICKEN AND LACHHA PARATHA (PUNJAB)



MIRCHI KA SALAN

It's a spicy curry foundation built with peanuts, sesame seeds, and long slit green chillies. It's noted for its spicy, creamy flavour, which comes from the use of peanuts and green chillies. To soften its spicy content, it is generally served with a rice-based biryani or any long grain pulao. It can, however,



be served with any type of rice or flatbread, such as Malabar parotta, roti, or even a garlic naan.

LUKHMI

This meal is a favourite appetiser at Hyderabadi weddings, but it also goes nicely with tea at an adda with friends. The name lukhmi is derived from the Urdu word luqma, which means "little nibble." Unlike samosa, lukhmi is a flat square shaped flour parcel loaded with beef or mutton-based filling and a flaky and crunchy upper crust. In some cafes, the food is offered in other shapes, such as triangles, and a vegetarian variant with a potato filling is also available.

HYDERABADI HALEEM

Haleem is a stew or porridge with a wonderful ghee/clarified butter flavour and a very slight acidic flavour from the lemon essence added while eating. Haleem can be prepared in a variety of ways, including utilising exclusively vegetarian ingredients. After fasting for the full day, the Hyderabadi style Haleem is an authentic and traditional Ramadan special dish served as an evening meal during iftar.

PATHAR KA GOSHT

Pathar ka gosht is a traditional Hyderabadi kebab prepared on a hot granite surface. The name pathar ka gosht comes from the Urdu words pathar, which means stone, and gosht, which means meat. It's usually cooked on a stone, although it can also be done on a grill pan. You can serve this dish with onions or lemon wedges.

PHIRNI

Phirni, also known as firni, is a traditional Indian sweet pudding made of basmati rice, milk, nuts, sugar, cardamom powder, saffron, or rose water, and flavoured with cardamom powder, saffron, or rose water. It is a must-have for festive occasions or unique celebrations in North India, such as Diwali and the Karwa Chauth Festival. You can serve phirni once it is cooled.





DOUBLE KA MEETHA
