

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
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AVANT-GARDE 2035: NEW LIFESTYLE TRENDS





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COMING IN 2026 - THE BUGATTI TOURBILLON

With its lightweight construction and instantaneous torque from electric motors, the Bugatti Tourbillon delivers extraordinary performance

n 2004, the reborn Bugatti brand transformed the world of automotive performance and luxury with the launch of Bugatti Tourbillion a 1,001 hp hypersports car: the Veyron. Now, 20 years after Bugatti invented the hypersports car, it redefines the concept completely with an entirely new powertrain and platform. This is the Bugatti Tourbillon.

The Bugatti Tourbillon now enters its testing phase, with prototypes already on the road in anticipation of customer deliveries in 2026. A total of 250 examples will be built, with a starting price of 3.8m EUR net. Hand-assembly will take place at the Bugatti Atelier in Molsheim, following the final W16-powered Bugatti models, Bolide and W16 Mistra.

THE BUGATTI TOURBILLION: AN AUTOMOTIVE ICON 'POUR L'ÉTERNITÉ'

The Tourbillon is 'shaped by speed'. The ability to travel at more than 400km/h requires every single surface, inlet and ridge to be finely honed to ensure it is not only aerodynamic but also beneficial to the car's thermodynamics. This is the guiding

principle of the Tourbillon, which then evolved around four Bugatti design elements inspired by history: the horseshoe grille, the Bugatti Line, the central ridge and the dual colour split.

Although beautiful in its design and proportions, every surface, intake and vent is carefully honed to balance the enormous aerodynamic forces of a car travelling at over 400km/h as well as the thermodynamic requirements of a V16 engine, electric motors and battery at full performance.

The Tourbillon features a number of patented technologies. As a result, the rear wing even remains submerged during top-speed runs, with a perfect equilibrium of forces generated by these new innovations. Much of this aerodynamic equilibrium is thanks to the new diffuser concept, which starts to climb from just behind the passenger cabin, rising at an ideal angle to keep the Tourbillon in perfect balance. The diffuser is built around a completely new crash concept, which is fully integrated within the structure of the diffuser itself, keeping it both enormously effective but also hidden from sight, enabling the open rear-end design.

At the heart of the Tourbillon's design ethos is the iconic horseshoe, from which all lines of the car originate, shaping the central fuselage volume. A set of advanced, electrically actuated dihedral doors not only allow for easy entry into the vehicle but provide a dramatic sense of arrival, able to be opened and closed from the key fob, the door opening button found just underneath the Bugatti Line and on the centre console.

The design and engineering teams pioneered an authentic analogue experience in the cabin. This intricately engineered masterpiece remains a focal point of the driving experience, fixed in place as the rim of the steering wheel rotates around it – a set-up known as a fixed hub steering wheel. Through this ingenious concept, Tourbillon drivers have an unobstructed view of their instrumentation independent of the steering angle because the spokes reach around the back of the instrument cluster

The centre console is a blend of crystal glass and aluminium, revealing the intricate workings of the switches and the engine start 'pull' lever that it hosts. The only screen in the car – capable of displaying Apple CarPlay, as well as vehicle data – is completely hidden from view unless drivers request it. An intricately engineered mechanism deploys the touchscreen from the top of the centre console; portrait mode for the reversing camera in just two seconds and full landscape mode in five seconds.

Every interior decision is made with ultimate performance in mind. The seats, for example, are fixed to the floor to be

as light and as low as they can be, and the pedal box can be electrically adjusted forward and backward to ensure a comfortable driving position for everyone.

Even the audio system is being engineered without traditional speakers and woofers, opting for an advanced system that features exciters on the door panels and throughout the car to use existing interior panels as speakers.

POWERTRAIN AND PERFORMANCE

This next-generation Bugatti hypersports car is powered by an all-new 8.3-litre naturally aspirated V16 engine – engineered with the help of Cosworth – paired with a front e-Axle with two electric motors and one electric motor mounted at the rear axle. In total, the Tourbillon produces 1,800 hp with 1,000 from the combustion engine itself and 800 hp from the electric motors. It's an extraordinary achievement – delivered thanks to a host of cutting-edge materials and technology. With its lightweight construction and instantaneous torque from the electric motors, the Bugatti Tourbillon delivers extraordinary performance. 0-100: 2.0 s 0-200: <5 s 0-300: <10 s 0-400: <25 s Top speed: 445 kph.



VISION VS REALITY - A HELICOPTER MOMENT

In the business of emotions and dreams, our ultimate goal is always to meet the needs of every member of the wedding party, no matter how sudden or unusual the request might be. However, achieving this can sometimes be more challenging than anticipated.

I remember a particular incident while planning a beach wedding in Goa. On the morning of the event, the groom expressed a sudden desire for a more dramatic entrance. He wanted to arrive via helicopter, Bollywood-style, and land next to the Varmala Stage, which was set up right on the beach. With the DJ, band, and décor all prepared for the Baraat scheduled to begin in the next three hours, this request posed a significant challenge.





As event planners, our instinct is to explore every possibility before turning down a request. Our team promptly sprang into action and managed to arrange a helicopter on very short notice. Unfortunately, due to the unique nature of the request and the constraints of the venue, we were unable to fulfil it. Nonetheless, this unusual set of circumstances presented a considerable challenge for our team.

I spoke with him and helped him calm down, and he eventually shared his concerns related to his friend's comments. It was challenging to reassure him that the remarks were meant in jest and posed no real threat.

We also explored alternative venues with fewer guests as a potential solution. Ultimately, it was the heartfelt discussion about his love for his bride-to-be that helped him overcome his fears and agree to proceed with the wedding. In such a delicate situation, we had limited control over the circumstances, but our focus remained on handling the crisis with care and empathy.



ooking for an adventure that's equal parts thrill and tranquillity? The Tungnath trek in Uttarakhand offers just that, with stunning landscapes and a touch of spiritual charm. This trek, known for attracting both nature lovers and devotees, takes you to the Tungnath Temple, the highest abode of Lord Shiva in the world, perched at an impressive altitude of 3,680 meters (12,073 feet). It's not just a religious site, but also a fantastic spot for those looking to soak in the beauty of the mountains.

The adventure begins in the charming village of Chopta, often called the 'Mini Switzerland of India.' From there, the trail leads you through stunning landscapes filled with lush green

meadows, dense forests, and incredible views of towering peaks like Nanda Devi and Chaukhamba. The trek is relatively short—about 4 kilometres (2.5 miles) to Tungnath—but it packs in all the exploration and scenic beauty you could ask for.

As you walk, you'll find yourself surrounded by rich biodiversity, with rhododendron trees, alpine flowers, and a variety of birds adding colour to the experience. The clear, crisp air and the majestic views of the snow-capped mountains make every step feel rewarding. And just when you think it can't get better, you'll reach the temple, where the serenity of the place and the spiritual energy is overwhelming.


For those who want a bit more adventure, a short, steep climb from Tungnath takes you to Chandrashila, a summit that offers 360-degree views of the Himalayas. Whether you're here for the trek, the spiritual significance, or simply to be among the mountains, the Tungnath trek promises an unforgettable experience that will stay with you long after you've returned home.

KNOW THE HISTORY BEHIND TUNGNATH


Tungnath is one of the few sacred sites where three great figures from ancient epics—the Pandavas, Lord Rama, and Ravana—are intricately connected through powerful stories. As part of the Panch Kedar, Tungnath Temple holds deep spiritual significance, especially in the Mahabharata.

After the Kurukshetra war, the Pandavas, burdened by guilt for killing their cousins, sought forgiveness from Lord Shiva. However, Lord Shiva, displeased with their actions, disguised himself as a bull and hid in Guptakashi. The determined Pandavas eventually discovered him, but Shiva's body reappeared in five different places: his hands at Tungnath, his hump at Kedarnath, and other parts at Rudranath, Madhyamaheshwar, and Kalpeshwar. In honour of this divine manifestation, the Pandavas built temples at each of these locations, now revered as the Panch Kedar.

Tungnath's sacred connection extends beyond the Mahabharata. According to another legend, Lord Rama meditated at Chandrashila, a peak near Tungnath, seeking peace and atonement after his victory over Ravana in the Ramayana. This spiritual link to Lord Rama adds further depth to the temple's significance.

Moreover, Tungnath is tied to Ravana, the central antagonist of the Ramayana. It is believed that Ravana, a devoted worshiper of Lord Shiva, performed penance at Tungnath to seek Shiva's blessings and strength. This intricate intertwining of stories from both the Mahabharata and Ramayana, involving the Pandavas, Lord Rama, and Ravana, makes Tungnath a place of profound spiritual importance, drawing pilgrims seeking blessings, forgiveness, and divine connection.

ROUTE TO DIVINITY

The journey from Haridwar to Tungnath takes you through the captivating Garhwal Himalayas, offering a blend of spirituality and natural beauty. Tungnath, standing at 3,680 meters (12073 feet), is the highest Shiva temple in the world.

Starting from Haridwar, the first stop is Rishikesh, a spiritual hub known for its iconic Lakshman Jhula and the peaceful Triveni Ghat on the banks of the Ganges. From Rishikesh, the route takes you to Devprayag, where the Alaknanda and Bhagirathi rivers merge to form the Ganges. Devprayag's confluence is considered sacred, and the Raghunath Temple is a key highlight.

Moving further, Srinagar in Uttarakhand is a serene stopover, offering a peaceful break before heading deeper into the mountains. The journey continues to Rudraprayag, where the Mandakini and Alaknanda rivers meet. This town holds religious importance, with temples like Rudranath and Koteshwar drawing visitors. The next stop, Ukhimath, is where the deities of Kedarnath are worshipped during winter. The Omkareshwar Temple and stunning views of Himalayan peaks are the key attractions here.

From Ukhimath, a short drive leads to Chopta, a picture sque hill station often referred to as "Mini Switzerland." Surrounded by lush meadows and dense forests, Chopta is the base for the trek to Tungnath. The 3.5 km trek offers breathtaking views of rhododendron forests and the majestic Himalayan

ranges. Tungnath Temple, perched at a high altitude, exudes a serene, spiritual atmosphere.

For those seeking more adventure, the trek can extend to Chandrashila Peak, 1.5 km above Tungnath, providing panoramic views of peaks like Nanda Devi, Chaukhamba, and Trishul, particularly stunning at sunrise or sunset.

ROUTE OVERVIEW

- Haridwar to Rishikesh (20 km, 45 mins): Spiritual town known for Lakshman Jhula and Triveni Ghat along the Ganges.
- Rishikesh to Devprayag (75 km, 2–3 hours): Confluence of Alaknanda and Bhagirathi rivers, forming the Ganges; visit the sacred Raghunath Temple.
- Devprayag to Srinagar (35 km, 1 hour): A peaceful town and educational hub, ideal for a short rest stop.
- Srinagar to Rudraprayag (33 km, 1 hour): Famous for the confluence of Mandakini and Alaknanda rivers; home to Rudranath and Koteshwar temples.
- Rudraprayag to Ukhimath (42 km, 1.5–2 hours): Religious town where Kedarnath deities are worshipped in winter; notable for Omkareshwar Temple and Himalayan views.
- Ukhimath to Chopta (29 km, 1.5 hours): The "Mini Switzerland" of India, is the base for the Tungnath trek with panoramic Himalayan views.
- Chopta to Tungnath Trek (3.5 km, 2–3 hours): Moderate trek through rhododendron forests to the revered Tungnath Shiva temple.
- Chandrashila Peak (Optional) (1.5 km, 45 mins): A steep climb from Tungnath offers 360-degree views of the Himalayas, especially stunning at sunrise or sunset.

Basketmaking is a cherished handicraft in India, deeply rooted in the country's cultural heritage. Artisans across various regions skillfully weave baskets using materials such as bamboo, cane, grass, and palm leaves, each technique reflecting local traditions and artistic expressions.

These handcrafted baskets serve a multitude of purposes: they are essential for carrying goods, storing items, and even playing a role in rituals and festivals. In various Indian festivals, moonj baskets are used for ceremonial purposes, such as carrying offerings to deities or serving food during community gatherings. Their aesthetic appeal makes them a popular choice for festive decorations. In rural areas, baskets are vital for agricultural tasks, helping transport harvested crops efficiently.

The Moonj basket handicraft is an ancient, eco-friendly weaving tradition that exemplifies the harmonious relationship between nature and craftsmanship. Primarily crafted by rural artisans in Uttar Pradesh, particularly in regions like Allahabad, Varanasi, and surrounding villages.

Made from a natural fibre that is both durable and sustainable, this traditional craft has deep roots in Indian culture, reflecting the resourcefulness of local communities and their commitment to utilizing available materials in environmentally conscious ways.





The Dying Process - Boiling The Colour With The Grass

In Indian craft traditions, Moonj baskets hold a significant place, symbolizing not just functional artistry but also the skills passed down through generations. Today, they are increasingly relevant in contemporary sustainable fashion and home decor, appealing to a growing audience that values eco-friendly products.

The significance of Moonj baskets extends beyond their practical use; they are integral to daily life in local communities, often used for storage, carrying goods, and even as decorative elements that add a touch of rustic charm to homes. As we explore the intricacies of Moonj basket making, we uncover a rich heritage that continues to thrive, bridging traditional practices with modern sensibilities.

ORIGIN OF AN ANCIENT HANDICRAFT - MOONJ GRASS WEAVING

The technique of basket crafting is an ancient tradition practised by Indians for various purposes. The people have demonstrated

remarkable adaptability, utilizing the abundant resources nature provides. The craft of weaving baskets is almost as ancient as the skill of making ceramics. Reeds were woven together to create baskets that the old nomadic food gatherers used to store their food and other items that they gathered.

Later on, with the development of a variety of civilizations, the art of making baskets for both everyday use and ceremonial reasons began to take form. According to the customs and practices of the local community, unique designs have developed. Although the method that goes into making these items hasn't changed much over the years, natural colours are now being utilised to make them seem more appealing.

Allahabad region's fertile land supports the growth of a wide variety of plants and weeds, with bamboo being particularly abundant. Located near the banks of the Yamuna River in Allahabad, the village of Naini stands out as a major hub for the production of Moonj wild grass products.

Moonj and Kaasa, two types of wild grass, flourish along the riverbanks in the vast areas surrounding Allahabad. In addition to basket weaving, the area is also known for its thriving production of bamboo and cane products, which are sold in large quantities.

HOW ARE MOONJ BASKETS MADE?

Moonj basketry can be found in nearly all local marketplaces throughout contemporary Prayagraj or Allahabad, where it is highly sought after by both residents and visitors. The wild grasses known as moonj and rara thrive along the banks of the rivers surrounding Allahabad. Moonj refers to the outer layer of the grass, which is scraped off and twisted together. Initially, the "Sarpat" grass appears lush and green.

After being harvested, the skin is removed, and the strands are tied into knots, referred to locally as "balla of the moonj." This coiled grass is then dried in the sun, a process that requires careful monitoring; if it dries too much, it becomes difficult to bend during weaving. To create intricate designs, some of the coiled grass is dyed using boiling water, resulting in a variety of colours.

The colour of the grass is achieved with the use of dye. The grass is dyed with hues derived from the kaccha rangraw plant. In a container made of metal, water is brought to a boil at an elevated temperature, and then the colour powder is added to it. For the dried, off-white Moonj grass to absorb the colour, it is submerged in a boiling solution.

Salt is added to the boiling liquid during the dying process because it allows the colour to last for a longer period after it has been applied. When the grass has reached the desired colour, it is cut down and left to dry in the shade. After being dried, this coil is first submerged in cold water, and then the weaving process may begin. Twigs are twisted into coils, and then the baskets themselves are constructed.

Often, the twigs are dyed to create designs. At the very end, softer grass, also known as kaasa grass, is used for

retouching. The final products are jars, pots, trays, and baskets that are capable of holding a certain amount of weight while also being sturdy and long-lasting.

TRADITIONAL USES OF MOONJ BASKETS

The skill of basket weaving is put to use for routine tasks. The Moonj basketry skill has mainly been in the spotlight because of the significant participation of rural women in its production.

The most important reason for weaving these baskets is so that they may be put to use in the kitchen to put away food. The flour and other food grains are stored in the baskets, which are used in the kitchen. When food, particularly rotis, a kind of flatbread is kept in them, it does not become stale.

The simpler and more compact baskets are the ones that are intended for day-to-day usage. In contrast to the other villages, where it is only practised as a hobby, basket weaving provides a means of subsistence for its practitioners in Allahabad.

It is possible to recognise the Tharus of Behraich baskets by their daring shapes and the sculpted animal and human patterns that they often include.

In some parts of Uttar Pradesh, the mothers of the brides make these baskets by hand as a wedding gift for their daughters. For the wedding of her daughter, a mother would craft one-of-a-kind baskets embellished with shell tassels.

Some circular baskets or maunis are given to the bride to take with her, and it is loaded with sweets, grain products, and other presents.

Jyotisar – The Birthplace of The Bhagavad Gita

Here are some of the sacred sites in Kurukshetra that trace back to the epic Mahabharata. Let's take a closer look at each one to give you a deeper understanding of that yuga (time).

JYOTISAR - THE BIRTHPLACE OF THE BHAGAVAD GITA

Jyotisar, located on the banks of the Jyotisar Sarovar in Kurukshetra, Haryana, holds immense significance in Indian mythology. Even before the Mahabharata war, Kurukshetra was considered a sacred land, which is why Lord Krishna chose this place to guide the forces of dharma in the battle. It was here that Lord Krishna delivered the Bhagavad Gita to Arjuna, an event celebrated annually as Gita Jayanti on the Shukla Ekadashi (11th day of the waxing moon) in the month of Margashirsha.

During this time, the Gita Deepotsav is celebrated with thousands of lamps illuminating the sacred banks of Brahma Sarovar, Sannihit Sarovar, and Jyotisar Sarovar. The name 'Jyotisar' is a combination of "Jyoti," meaning light of knowledge, and "Sar," meaning essence. It represents the essence of wisdom from the Vedas, Upanishads, and Puranas, all distilled in the Bhagavad Gita, which continues to bring spiritual enlightenment to people's lives. It was here that the essence of the Bhagavad Gita was conveyed to Arjuna through the timeless shloka:

"यदा यदा ही धर्मस्य ग्लानिर्भवति भारत। अभ्युत्थानमधर्मस्य तदात्मानम सृज्याहम।"

Translated as: "Whenever there is a decline in righteousness (dharma) and an increase in unrighteousness (adharma), O Bharata (Arjuna), at that time, I manifest Myself on earth."

In this verse, Lord Krishna promises that whenever evil rises and righteousness wanes, He incarnates to restore balance and protect the virtuous.

At Jyotisar, visitors can witness the spot where it is believed Lord Krishna spoke the Gita under the ancient Akshaya Vata (banyan tree). This sacred tree, known as the 'Gitopadesha Sthala,' is marked to honour its legendary significance. Pilgrims often visit to pay respects, and a sculpture of Krishna's chariot stands nearby, symbolizing the divine conversation between Krishna and Arjuna. The Haryana tourism department also hosts a captivating light and sound show, reenacting this profound moment each evening.

BRAHMA SAROVAR – THE ANCIENT SACRED WATER BODY

Brahma Sarovar is one of the most prominent tourist attractions in Kurukshetra. While this site is not solely famous for the Mahabharata battle, it is renowned for various fascinating events that have taken place here. Located in Thanesar, Kurukshetra, Brahma Sarovar is a sacred man-made reservoir, the largest of its kind in Asia, measuring 3,600 feet in length, 1,500 feet in width, and 45 feet in depth.

In Hinduism, bathing holds great significance for both internal and external purification, and many religious sites feature water pools or sarovars near temples and gurdwaras. The Hindu genealogy registers of Kurukshetra are preserved here. According to legend, Lord Brahma created the universe from this holy land after performing a grand yajna, which is why the place is named Brahma Sarovar.

During the final days of the Mahabharata war, Duryodhana hid underwater in this reservoir to escape Bhima. There is also a spot where Draupadi washed her hair with Dushasana's blood.

Local beliefs suggest that the reservoir was first renovated by King Kuru. In the centre of the lake is Sarveswar Mahadev Temple, dedicated to Lord Shiva, where it is believed that the

Shivalinga manifested itself. According to the Mahabharata, the Pandavas were absolved of their sins by bathing in the lake during the war.

A grand fair is held here during solar eclipses, drawing millions of devotees who take a holy dip in the waters of Brahma Sarovar.

BHISHMA KUND - THE FINAL RESTING PLACE OF BHISHMA

Bhishma Kund, a stepwell named after Bhishma Pitamaha, is believed to be the spot where he lay on a bed of arrows, crafted by his grandson Arjuna. This site in Kurukshetra holds a deep connection to the epic Mahabharata.

Bhishma was revered by both the Pandavas and Kauravas, and according to legend, he possessed a boon that allowed him to choose the moment of his death.

After being wounded in battle, Bhishma came here to rest and observe the ongoing conflict. As the story goes, while lying here, he grew thirsty and requested water.

To quench his thirst, Arjuna shot an arrow into the ground, releasing a stream of water that formed Bhishma Kund. This site also features a temple and remains a popular destination for visitors drawn by its historical and mythological significance.

Bhishma Kund, located in Narakatari village near Kurukshetra, is a holy place linked to the Mahabharata battle. It is said that on the 10th day of the battle, Bhishma, after being wounded, asked for water.

In response, his grandson Arjuna shot his Parjanyastra arrow into the earth, causing a fountain of water to emerge and quench Bhishma's thirst. Today, this sacred kund continues to attract tourists and pilgrims alike.

SANNIHIT SAROVAR – THE CONFLUENCE OF SEVEN SACRED RIVERS

Located on the outskirts of Kurukshetra, this sacred water reservoir is believed to be the convergence point of the seven tributaries of the now-vanished Saraswati River. According to legend, the Sarovar is the eternal abode of Lord Vishnu. Local lore holds that on the night of a new moon, the sanctity of all pilgrimage sites, or Tirthas, gathers here. It is said that performing shradh, a memorial prayer for ancestors, during a solar eclipse and bathing in the tank grants the merit equivalent to a thousand Ashwamedh sacrifices, an ancient Vedic ritual signifying a king's sovereignty.

THE SRI KRISHNA MUSEUM – PRESERVING THE MAHABHARATA LEGACY

The popular Krishna Museum in Kurukshetra, established in 1987 by the Kurukshetra Development Board, showcases the city's rich history. The museum is dedicated to themes centred around Shri Krishna, the Mahabharata, and Kurukshetra, offering a glimpse into the region's ancient legacy.

These themes are vividly brought to life in the museum's galleries, displaying rare artefacts such as pottery, miniature paintings, sculptures, terracotta items, palm leaf etchings, ivory and bronze castings, and tableaux related to these historical events. Lord Krishna is depicted in various roles – as a war hero, philosopher, divine incarnation, godhead, benevolent lover, and master statesman. The museum also features an impressive collection of folk art in Madhubani, Kangra, and Pattachitra styles, captivating visitors with their beauty.

Visitors to this ancient land explore its historic battlefields and connect with the enduring teachings of dharma and the essence of Indian spirituality.

Then there's Dohkileh, a pork salad that can be as simple or as fancy as you like, with fresh vegetables and a tangy mix

of onions, green chillies, and ginger. For something versatile and tasty, try Pumaloi, a steamed rice cake with coconut, or end your meal with Pukhlein, a sweet treat made from rice and jaggery.

UNIQUE INGREDIENTS AND COOKING STYLES IN KHASI CUISINE

The Khasi people from Meghalaya use unique ingredients and cooking techniques that make their cuisine stand out from other Indian culinary traditions. Let us tell you all about it!

One of the standout ingredients is Lakadong Turmeric. This turmeric is known for its high curcumin content, which gives it a vibrant colour and health benefits. It's a prized ingredient in Khasi cooking. Another staple in Khasi food is bamboo shoots. They add a distinctive flavour and crunch to both vegetarian and non-vegetarian dishes.

Black sesame seeds are also commonly used, especially in dishes like Dohneiiong, which is pork cooked in a black sesame paste. These seeds give a rich, nutty flavour to the food.

DIWALI WITH A TWIST

Ever wondered how different parts of India celebrate the same festival in unique ways? We bring you stories, rituals, and traditions that make Diwali festivities shine in every corner of India

hen we think of Diwali, the Festival of Lights, images of twinkling diyas, vibrant rangolis, and bursting fireworks flood our minds. Across India, people celebrate this five-day festival in many familiar ways—cleaning their homes, wearing new clothes, exchanging sweets, and praying to Goddess Lakshmi.

Diwali, also known as Deepavali's core theme remains consistent—symbolizing the triumph of light over darkness and good over evil—the stories, rituals, and traditions vary widely across regions. In North India, Diwali marks the return of Lord Rama to Ayodhya after defeating the demon king Ravana, a story central to the celebration. Meanwhile, in the East, the festival takes on a different tone, with devotees worshipping Goddess Kali, emphasizing her strength and power.

But beyond the well-known customs lie lesser-known traditions that add unique flavours to this dazzling celebration. In Himachal Pradesh, for instance, the Pathar Mela, a lively stone-pelting festival, adds an adventurous twist to the celebrations. In Chhattisgarh, the festival is celebrated with 'Diyari,' a tradition that revolves around agriculture and cattle, reflecting the region's strong connection to farming. Each of these unique customs highlights India's incredible cultural diversity during Diwali.

Let's explore the vibrant customs and rituals that make this celebration truly one-of-a-kind!

THE BOAT FESTIVAL IN ODISHA

While most of us light up the streets with firecrackers, Odisha lights up the water! During Diwali, locals in Odisha celebrate a special tradition called "Boita Bandana," or the Boat Festival,

to honour their maritime heritage. People make tiny boats out of banana bark, paper, or cork, decorating them with small oil lamps, betel leaves, and flowers. They set these miniature boats afloat in rivers, ponds, and the sea, paying homage to their ancestors who were once sea traders. The sight of these boats drifting in the water, lit by the soft glow of oil lamps, is a unique and picturesque way of celebrating the festival.

PATTHAR MELA IN HIMACHAL PRADESH

The Pathar Mela, or stone-pelting festival, is an ancient tradition celebrated with enthusiasm in Halog village near Shimla, Himachal Pradesh. Held annually the day after Deepavali, this unique event draws large crowds from nearby villages. The festival's origins lie in a centuries-old practice where, according to local folklore, human sacrifices were once made at the Bhadrakali Temple to appease the goddess. One of the queens of the Dhami estate named Sati abolished this

practice, replacing it with the symbolic act of stone pelting.

During the festival, two groups, the Katedus and Jhanogis, throw stones at each other in a friendly manner. The pelting starts in the afternoon and ends when someone is injured.

The Pathar Mela continues to be celebrated as a symbol of sacrifice and community unity. The villagers keep the tradition alive with respect for their cultural heritage. Although unusual, this festival highlights the strong ties to local traditions in Himachal Pradesh, making it a significant event for the people of Halog.

CROP MARRIAGE AT BASTAR, CHATTISGARH (DIYARI)

In the Bastar district of Chhattisgarh, the festival is celebrated uniquely as 'Diyari', a festival deeply connected to agriculture and the well-being of cattle. The celebration begins with an important ritual called the marriage of crops, where freshly harvested crops, typically rice or millets, are symbolically married to an idol of Lord Narayana. This act represents a bond

between the farmers' harvest and divine forces, performed to ensure a successful and bountiful farming season ahead.

Following this, a puja (worship) is conducted to seek blessings for the health and protection of the villagers' cattle, which play a crucial role in farming activities. Farmers decorate their cattle, often with garlands and painted horns, to honour them for their indispensable role in agriculture. This ritual highlights the close relationship between the people of Bastar and their livestock, acknowledging their importance in the agricultural cycle.

The Diyari festival reflects the region's strong agricultural traditions and the villagers' gratitude towards nature and animals. Rather than focusing on fireworks and lights, this version of Deepavali emphasizes the vital connection between the land, its produce, and the livestock, ensuring prosperity for the community in the coming year.

BANDI CHHOR DIWAS: THE SIKH FESTIVAL OF FREEDOM

Bandi Chhor Diwas is a significant Sikh festival celebrated to mark the release of the sixth Sikh Guru, Guru Hargobind Singh Ji, from imprisonment by the Mughal Emperor Jahangir in 1619. The term "Bandi Chhor" means "Liberator of Prisoners," as Guru Hargobind Singh not only secured his own freedom but also released 52 Hindu princes who were wrongfully imprisoned alongside him.

The story behind Bandi Chhor Diwas is deeply rooted in Sikh values of justice and compassion. Guru Hargobind Singh was imprisoned for standing up against Mughal oppression. Upon his release, he refused to leave unless the 52 princes

were also freed. In a clever agreement with Jahangir, he ensured that all of the princes were released by using a cloak with 52 tassels, allowing each prince to hold onto one as they walked out of captivity.

Bandi Chhor Diwas coincides with the Hindu festival of Diwali, and the Golden Temple in Amritsar is illuminated with thousands of lights and diyas in celebration. Sikhs around the world commemorate the day with prayers, kirtans, and community meals (langar), celebrating not only the Guru's release but also the Sikh values of freedom, equality, and justice for all.

BHUT CHATURDASHI IN WEST BENGAL

Another unique tradition from West Bengal, celebrated just before Diwali, is Bhut Chaturdashi, which can be loosely translated as the "Night of the Spirits." According to belief, on this night, the spirits of ancestors return to visit their families. To honor them, 14 diyas (earthen lamps) are lit to guide the spirits back home and ward off evil entities. Along with lighting lamps, families also consume 14 different kinds of leafy greens (known as choddo shaak) to protect themselves from harmful spirits. This eerie yet fascinating tradition brings an element of spirituality and respect for the afterlife to Diwali celebrations.

CHOPDA PUJAN IN MAHARASHTRA

Diwali marks the start of a new financial year for many businesses in India, but Maharashtra takes this tradition to another level with a special ceremony called "Chopda Pujan." On this day, businesses big and small worship their accounting books, also known as "chopda." It's believed

that starting a new accounting book on Diwali will bring prosperity to the business in the coming year. In today's digital age, some people even perform puja on their laptops or accounting software! This ritual signifies starting fresh with renewed energy, making it an important day for merchants, traders, and entrepreneurs.

HOOKAH PAATI IN REGIONS OF BIHAR

Laxmi Ghar, Daridra Bahar (Lakshmi in, Poverty out) is a special Diwali tradition in the Anga, Mithilanchal, and Kosi regions of Bihar. Known as Hookah Paati (हुक्का पाती), this ritual symbolizes the welcoming of Goddess Lakshmi into homes.

It is believed that even King Karna of Anga used to follow this tradition during Diwali. Despite modern influences, the tradition of Hookah Patti, made from sanathi (संठी- jute stick), remains strong in these areas.

In the afternoon, the head of the household prepares a Hookah Patti using a rope made of sanathi and paat (flax). A ghee lamp and a Hookah Patti are placed in the home and near the family deity's shrine to invite prosperity. These Hookah Pattis are also kept at various locations where gods and goddesses are worshipped.

This tradition dates back to ancient Sanatan times. Even today, people place Hookah Pattis in their homes and take them to nearby temples. Before starting the ritual, a lamp and Hookah Patti are placed in each household and taken to the temple for blessings.

Scientific Reason: The sanathi fire is believed to have antibacterial properties. Jute (sanathi) releases very little carbon dioxide when burned, and the smoke is said to help

eliminate harmful insects and bacteria, much like the lighting of a lamp. Roaming around the house with a burning sanathi is thought to purify the surroundings.

NARAK CHATURDASI IN GOA

In Goa, Narak Chaturdashi celebrated a day before Diwali, is a vibrant and unique festival symbolizing the victory of good over evil. It commemorates Lord Krishna's slaying of the demon king Narakasura, freeing the world from the demon's tyranny and marking the dawn of a new era of light and goodness.

The celebration in Goa is marked by a fascinating tradition where large, colourful statues of Narakasura are created by locals. These effigies, often as tall as buildings, are made from paper, wood, and straw, depicting the demon king in fearsome forms. In the early hours of the morning, the effigies are paraded through the streets accompanied by music and fireworks, creating a lively spectacle. The climax of the celebration comes when these effigies are set ablaze, symbolizing the destruction of evil forces and cleansing the community.

Following the burning, people take oil baths and wear new clothes, signifying purification and the readiness to embrace prosperity. Traditional Goan sweets, like neureos and fov, are prepared and shared among family and friends. Narak Chaturdashi in Goa is a spectacular fusion of mythology, community, and celebration, lighting the way for the grand festivities that follow.

There is much more to discover about the vibrant diversity of celebrations across India - and this is just the beginning.

THE MAGIC OF CHHATH PUJA

Chhath Puja Purvanchal Mahaparv celebrates the deep bond between humanity and nature, bringing Bihar's rich cultural heritage to life

hat makes a festival stand out from the countless others across India's vibrant cultural landscape? In the case of Chhath Puja, it's the deep connection between people and nature. This ancient festival, especially popular in Bihar, is dedicated to the Sun God, Surya, and his consort, Usha. What's truly special about Chhath is that it's celebrated outdoors, on the banks of rivers or other water bodies, where devotees offer prayers to the setting and rising sun, symbolizing the endless cycle of life.

What also makes this festival stand out is its simplicity. There are no grand processions or extravagant rituals—just pure devotion. Millions of people across India and the world take part, making it a deeply personal expression of faith,

strength, and gratitude. For the people of Bihar, Chhath is more than just a religious observance; it reflects the deep bond they share with nature and their community.

Let's explore and understand the rituals and significance that make Chhath Puja such a unique and powerful celebration.

AN ANCIENT FESTIVAL ROOTED IN NATURE

The history of Chhath Puja is ancient, with references to the festival found in the Rig Veda, one of the oldest known scriptures in human history. The Vedic rituals performed during Chhath were originally meant to thank the Sun God for sustaining life on Earth and to seek his blessings for prosperity and well-being.

The festival is unique in its worship of natural elements—primarily the Sun (Surya), water, and earth. Unlike many other Hindu festivals that involve elaborate temple rituals, Chhath is observed along riverbanks and other water bodies, under the open sky. This closeness to nature highlights the deep ecological and environmental consciousness embedded in the festival's rituals.

The mythology surrounding Chhath is also fascinating. According to Hindu legends, it was first performed by Karna, the son of Surya, a key figure in the Mahabharata. Another story connects Chhath to Draupadi and the Pandavas, who performed the ritual to reclaim their kingdom. These tales highlight the power of the Sun God and underscore Chhath's importance as a source of strength, prosperity, and spiritual awakening.

A popular story about King Priyavrata, the son of the first Manu, Svayambhu. He was very sad because he and his wife, Queen Malini, had no children. Following the advice of the sage Kashyapa, the king performed a special yajna (ritual) to pray for a son. Soon after, Queen Malini gave birth to a baby, but sadly, the child was born lifeless. The royal family was heartbroken.

In their moment of despair, the goddess Shashthi appeared in the sky. She introduced herself as Chhathi Maiya, the sixth form of Goddess Parvati, and said, "I protect all children and bless those who are childless." With her divine touch, she

brought the baby back to life. Filled with gratitude, King Priyavrata worshipped Chhathi Maiya, and it is believed that this marked the beginning of Chhath Puja, which eventually became a widespread tradition.

THE RITUALS OF CHHATH PUJA

Chhath Puja spans over four days, with each day carrying a deep symbolic meaning that reflects the devotees' journey towards spiritual purity.

Day 1: Nahay Khay (Bathing and Eating)

The first day of Chhath Puja marks the beginning of the devotees' spiritual cleansing. On this day, devotees bathe in holy rivers, usually the Ganges or local water bodies, and bring home water to prepare offerings. The home is thoroughly cleaned, symbolizing the removal of impurities. The meal prepared on this day is simple, often consisting of rice, dal, and pumpkin collectively called Kadua-Bhaat , cooked without garlic or onions to maintain purity. This day sets the tone for the rigorous fasting that will follow.

Day 2: Kharna

The second day of Chhath is marked by rigorous fasting and purification. Devotees observe a full-day fast without

even drinking water, symbolizing self-discipline and spiritual cleansing. The fast is broken after sunset with a simple meal known as "prasad," typically consisting of jaggery kheer (rice pudding), chapati, and bananas, prepared without salt, onion, or garlic to maintain purity. The prasad is shared with family and neighbours, signifying communal harmony. After Kharna, devotees begin a 36-hour fast without water, leading to the main rituals of offering prayers to the Sun God.

Day 3: Sandhya Arghya (Evening Offerings)

The third day of Chhath is the most important, marked by the offering of Thekua, a traditional sweet that is crunchy, flavourful, and long-lasting. As the sun sets, devotees gather at riverbanks, standing in knee-deep water with bamboo baskets filled with fruits, sugarcane, and Thekua to pray to the setting sun.

This unique ritual, symbolizing the cycle of life and death, highlights the significance of both. Chhath is one of the few festivals that worship the setting sun, reminding us to respect life's highs and lows. The Sandhya Arghya, with thousands offering prayers, is a mesmerising sight.

Day 4: Usha Arghya (Morning Offerings)

The final day of Chhath Puja begins before dawn, with devotees returning to the riverbanks to offer their prayers to the rising sun. The morning Arghya is a moment of hope, as devotees thank the Sun God for sustaining life and seek blessings for their families and communities. After the prayers, the fast is broken, and the Prasad is distributed among family members, neighbours, and friends.

The Usha Arghya signifies renewal, optimism, and gratitude. The rituals performed during these two days symbolize the cycle of life—death (evening sun) and rebirth (morning sun)—and our constant connection to the natural world around us.

CHHATH PUJA AND ITS CULTURAL SIGNIFICANCE IN BIHAR

For the people of Bihar, Chhath is more than just a religious observance; it's an integral part of their cultural identity. One of the most striking aspects of Chhath Puja is the role

of women in the festival. While both men and women participate, it is often the women who undertake the fasts and lead the rituals. This gives Chhath a unique position among Indian festivals, as it empowers women as spiritual leaders within their families and communities.

Chhath Puja also emphasizes the values of simplicity and purity. The offerings used during the festival are humble—fruits, sugarcane, and Thekua- "highlighting the idea that devotion lies not in the grandeur of the offerings, but in the purity of the heart".

The image of thousands of devotees standing in rivers, praying to the sky, highlights Bihar's deep bond with nature. Chhath Puja serves as a reminder of the sacredness of water, land, and sunlight—vital elements that sustain life. In today's era of growing environmental awareness, this ancient festival celebrates the harmony between humans and the natural world.

While Bihar remains the heart of Chhath Puja celebrations, the festival has spread far beyond its borders. With the migration of Biharis to other parts of India and the world, Chhath is now observed in cities as far-flung as Delhi, Mumbai, and Kolkata, and even internationally in countries like Nepal, Mauritius, and the United States.

Chhath Puja goes beyond religious rituals, teaching important values of humility, gratitude, and community. In today's fast-paced, individualistic world, this festival brings people together—families, neighbours, and even strangers—breaking barriers of caste and community through shared devotion.
