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At the Mahakumbh 2025, tent cities are being set up at the banks of the Sangam and key areas like Parade Ground, Arail, and Jhunsi.

The tent city will offer sheer luxury with three categories of accommodation to choose from.

Villa, Maharaja, and Swiss Cottage-the three types of accommodation will offer unique amenities to suit various preferences of the travellers.

The site at Parade Ground will have 55 tents/Swiss cottages,

while the site at Jhunsi will spread over 2.5 acres and accommodate 200 luxury cottages, while a larger tent city at Arail will feature 2000 cottages across 25 acres, with deluxe, super deluxe, and luxury options.

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MAHAKUMBH 2025: A JOURNEY TOWARDS SANATAN

At Prayagraj, the holy confluence of Ganga, Yamuna and the mythical Saraswati cleanses the body while the Sanatan Dharma uplifts the soul

Ithough sacred Mahakumbh occurs every 12 years, this year it holds a special significance. The Mahakumbh 2025 marks completion of a cycle of 12 full Mahakumbhs thus completing 144 years.

A CELEBRATION OF FAITH AND UNITY

The grand Mahakumbh 2025 began on January 13, 2025, at the sacred Sangam in Prayagraj, showcasing spirituality and India's rich cultural heritage. Rooted in Sanatan Dharma, the festival highlights unity, self-discovery, and the enduring legacy of faith. Running until February 26, 2025, it is set to welcome a staggering 40 crore visitors from around the globe.

The first Amrit Snan, held on January 14 (Makar Sankranti), saw 3.5 crore devotees take a sacred dip in the holy confluence of the Ganga, Yamuna, and mythical Saraswati rivers, symbolising purification. Two more Amrit Snans on January 29 and February 3 further emphasise spiritual renewal.

Pilgrims coming from countries like Israel, Russia, and Peru and across the world reflect Mahakumbh's universal appeal. Mahakumbh embodies "Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam" (The world is one family), fostering unity, cultural exchange, and spiritual transcendence.

UP GOVERNMENT'S MAHA-PLAN FOR MAHAKUMBH 2025

Triveni Sangam, Prayagra

The Uttar Pradesh government has made extensive preparations for the Maha Kumbh Mela 2025 in Prayagraj, which is expected to attract over 40 crore visitors.

- Infrastructure Development: The area is equipped with essential utilities, including water, sewage, and electrical lines. Additionally, 30 temporary pontoon bridges have been constructed to facilitate movement.
- **Transportation Enhancements:** Indian Railways has introduced sufficient special trains to manage the influx of visitors.
- Healthcare Services: A temporary hospital capable of handling up to 200 patients at a time has been set up to provide medical care during the festival. This facility is staffed with healthcare professionals to address any medical emergencies.
- Sanitation Measures: Approximately 10,000 sanitation workers have been deployed to maintain cleanliness throughout the event. Under the Swachh Kumbh initiative, around 150,000 toilets and urinals have been installed in the Mela area. A QR code-based monitoring system is being launched to track sanitation levels in toilets.

- Security Arrangements: A robust security framework has been implemented, with 40,000 police officers and Al-equipped surveillance cameras ensuring the safety of attendees. This includes crowd management and realtime monitoring to prevent any untoward incidents.
- Technological Integration: The "Kumbh Sah'Al'yak" Alpowered chatbot has been introduced to assist pilgrims with information on the festival's history, travel guidance, key attractions, and accommodation planning. This service is available in multiple Indian languages and can be accessed via WhatsApp, the Mahakumbh 2025 mobile app, and the official website.

THE GRAND TENT CITY AT MAHAKUMBH

The Uttar Pradesh State Tourism Development Corporation (UPSTDC) has established a mega "tent city" at strategic locations including Arail Ghat, Parade Ground, and Jhunsi, with 2,000 tents of various categories to accommodate the massive influx of pilgrims and travellers.

Visitors to Prayagraj during Mahakumbh 2025 can explore nearby attractions that enrich the spiritual experience.

Hanuman Temple: Located near Allahabad Fort, this temple is famous for its awe-inspiring 20-foot-long reclining idol of Lord Hanuman. It also houses 108 sacred Shiva Lingas, making it a significant site for devotees seeking blessings.

Narayan Ashram: Situated along the serene Ganga banks, this ashram is adorned with intricate stone carvings, ideal for meditation.

Mankameshwar Temple: Revered for its self-manifested Shiv-linga, this temple holds a deep spiritual significance. Rituals during Mondays and Shivratri attract large crowds.

A SOUL-STIRRING JOURNEY TO MAHAKUMBH 2025 IN PRAYAGRAJ

From Curious Traveller to Transformed Soul: My Life-Changing Experience at Mahakumbh 2025

orn into a family that firmly believes in imbibing cultural values into their new generation, I have been brought up with great stories of famous epics like Ramayana and Mahabharata. My parents also introduced me to the relevance of Mahakumbh which is another great spiritual festival observed along the banks of river Ganga, Yamuna and the mythical Saraswati forming the Sangam at Prayagraj. However, I never got a chance to witness the Mahakumbh before 2025, when I finally decided to experience the mega celebrations first-hand. A more concentrate search on this year's Mahakumbh Mela 2025, I discovered, that it's not just a spiritual bathing event; but it is a celebration that dates back thousands of years, embodying spirituality, mythology, and unity. The Mahakumbh 2025 is special as it marks the completion of a cycle of 12 full Mahakumbhs thus completing 144 years.

As I scrolled through articles on the meticulous preparations made for Mahakumbh 2025, I stumbled upon a link to a dedicated app for the festival. Downloading it immediately, I was thrilled to see its comprehensive features—everything from booking flights, trains, and taxis to detailed maps of the sprawling Mahakumbh area. For a first-time visitor like me, navigating such an enormous event seemed less daunting.

The Mahakumbh at Prayagraj began on January 13, 2025, and I decided to take a dip at the Sangam on January 14, the first Amrit Snan of three major bathing dates during the 45 days Mahakumbh.

Without wasting a moment, I booked a flight from Delhi to Prayagraj. The app also guided me to the UPSTDC portal, where I found accommodation options at the Kumbh Tent City. The variety of luxury tents surprised me they had a perfect blend of comfort and authenticity for a solo traveller like me.

On December 13, I finally set out on my journey. The flight was smooth, and before I knew it, I was in Prayagraj, a city drenched in the vibrant hues of Mahakumbh fervour. The atmosphere was electric, alive with energy and devotion. An article I had read earlier echoed in my mind—"If you want to see India at one place, come to Mahakumbh."

I checked in at the Tent city in Arail area and the sight of the tent city brought an instant feeling of delight. The serene and calm surrounding of the Tent city presented the perfect escape for late night meditation. The next day on January 14, I moved already towards the Sangam to take a dip in the holy waters. As I reached close to the bathing area around 4 am, a sea of seers from various Akhadas were rushing towards the Sangam. Bathing among the ascetics who have survived years of tough Anusthanas (rituals) for decades, I felt blessed. The cold water on my body felt like it has awakened a more conscious self and I started looking at my surroundings with a deeper gaze understanding the essence of the celebrations.

The next few days were nothing short of transformative as it came as an opportunity to explore the site and take a dip in the holy waters at the Triveni Sangam again and engage with spiritual leaders across Akhadas.

The Uttar Pradesh state government has put up a grand show for 45 days to make every corner of the Mahakumbh city spotless. After the snan, I moved ahead towards the Akhadas

where I requested one of the Akhadas head's to help me delve deeper in the significance of the largest spiritual congregation.

It was amazing to witness how the Akhadas ardently follow the ancient Guru-Shishya (teacher-student) tradition and pass on the wisdom to the most eligible disciples. The seers I met were welcoming and generous, sharing words of wisdom that resonated deeply. It was like stepping back in time, experiencing India's living traditions in their purest form.

Among the many attractions, two stood out vividly. The helicopter ride over the Mahakumbh grounds offered a breath-taking aerial view of the vast Mahakumbh area, tent city and the confluence of the Ganga, Yamuna, and the mythical Saraswati rivers. Meanwhile, a serene yoga retreat I attended left me rejuvenated and at peace, balancing the spiritual and the physical. Every step that I walked on the serene banks of the Sangam, I was inching towards salvation from the worldly chaos and evolve as a human.

Traversing through the Mahakumbh city with the sole objective of understanding India's vast diversity, I realized that this journey was about more than just travel. It was an opportunity to witness the unity in diversity that defines Bharat. The Mahakumbh is not just a festival; it is a confluence of faith, tradition, and humanity.

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MAHASHIVRATRI: A NIGHT OF INFINITE LIGHT

Mahashivratri, a night of divine energy, is dedicated to Lord Shiva, the destroyer of illusions and the creator of new beginnings!

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he moment gets filled with trance as we celebrate the supreme power with a great sense of devotion. In 2025, Mahashivratri will be celebrated on February 26 uniting devotees across the world in reverence and spirituality. Observed with deep veneration, it honours Lord Shiva's immense power and seeks his blessings for inner peace, spiritual growth, and liberation. This sacred night serves as a reminder to pause, reflect, and connect with the divine, offering an opportunity to align with the universal energy that Shiva embodies.

THE HISTORY BEHIND MAHASHIVRATRI

Mahashivratri is surrounded by rich legends that add to its spiritual significance. It is believed to mark the divine union of Lord Shiva and Goddess Parvati, symbolising the merging of Purusha (mind) and Prakriti (nature).

The towering Adiyogi statue being the largest Shiva bust sculpture in the world is illuminated beautifully and becomes the centrepiece of the celebrations, drawing thousands.

Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh

As the spiritual capital of India, Varanasi hosts vibrant Mahashivratri celebrations at the Kashi Vishwanath Temple. Devotees offer bel patra, milk, and flowers to the Shiva Linga, and the city buzzes with processions, bhajans, and mesmerising chants of "Om Namah Shivaya". The Ganga Aarti adds to the spiritual fervour.

Sivasagar, Assam

The Shiva Dol Temple in Sivasagar is the centre of Mahashivratri celebrations. Devotees light lamps, offer prayers, and participate in cultural events, making the festival both spiritual and festive.

Khajuraho, Madhya Pradesh

The UNESCO World Heritage temples of Khajuraho celebrate Mahashivratri with rituals and artistic performances. The Matangeshwar Temple sees special prayers, and the cultural events showcase India's rich heritage in music and dance.

RITUALS THAT MAKE IT SACRED

Mahashivratri is celebrated with great faith, vibrant rituals, and unique traditions across India. Devotees observe a daylong fast, consuming only fruits and water to purify their body and mind. Shiva temples become hubs of worship, where offerings like milk, honey, bel patra (bilva leaves), and flowers are made to the Shiva Linga.



THE CHARM OF SNOW AND WINTER SPORTS

Hill stations typically receive snow from December to February, with some higher-altitude regions experiencing snowfall as early as November or extending into March.

CHADAR TREK: A WALK ON THE FROZEN ZANSKAR RIVER

The Chadar Trek is a canvas painted in frost and silence, where every step over the frozen Zanskar River feels like tracing nature's most fragile artwork

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t is one of the most exciting and unique adventures, not just in India but across the globe. The trek takes you across the frozen Zanskar River in Ladakh, offering breathtaking views and an experience like no other. This is not just about walking on ice but exploring the beauty of nature and pushing your limits in one of the coldest places on Earth.

WHAT IS THE CHADAR TREK?

The word "Chadar" means "sheet," which describes the thick sheet of ice that forms on the Zanskar River during winter. From January to February, when temperatures drop as low as -30°C, the river freezes and creates a natural path for trekkers. Walking on this icy surface, surrounded by tall mountains and snowy landscapes, feels like stepping into another world.

The trek starts at Chilling, a small village near Leh, and covers about 105 kilometres over 6 to 9 days. Each day, the ice changes—sometimes it's smooth and shiny, and other times it's rough and uneven, making the journey full of surprises.

AN ADVENTURE LIKE NO OTHER

The Chadar Trek is challenging but rewarding. You'll walk for hours each day on slippery ice in freezing temperatures, testing your strength and patience. At night, you'll camp in caves or tents under the starry Himalayan sky, listening to the stillness of nature.

Despite the tough conditions, the trek is full of magical moments. You'll see frozen waterfalls, icy cliffs, and beautiful valleys that look like scenes from a movie. Each view is



unique, and no two days on the trek are the same. It's an adventure that will stay with you forever.

DETAILED ITINERARY FOR THE TREK

The Chadar Trek is an 8-day adventure across the frozen Zanskar River in Ladakh. A perfect balance of acclimatisation, safety, and exploration, this trek is one of the most unique experiences in the world.

Day 1: Arrival in Leh (11,500 ft)

Your journey begins in Leh, the capital of Ladakh. Upon arrival, check into your guesthouse and spend the day resting and acclimatising to the high altitude to prevent acute mountain sickness (AMS). Leh's thin air can be challenging, so avoid overexertion. If you're feeling up to it, explore the Leh Market, visit Shanti Stupa, or enjoy the serene views from Leh Palace. Early acclimatisation is key to a successful trek, so hydrate well and keep warm.



Day 3: Drive to Chilling and Trek to Tilad Do (10,390 ft)

• Drive Duration: 3-4 hours (Leh to Chilling).

• Trek Distance: 2-3 km (Chilling to Tilad Do).

The day starts with a picturesque drive to Chilling, the starting point of the trek. En route, marvel at the confluence of the Indus and Zanskar Rivers and the rugged Himalayan landscapes. Once at Chilling, you'll begin your trek with a short 1-2 hour walk along the icy Zanskar River to Tilad Do, the first campsite. Experience your first-night camping by the frozen river, surrounded by pristine snow-clad peaks.

Accommodation: Tents at Tilad Do. Activity: Scenic drive, short trek, and camping.

Tip: Practice walking on ice to familiarise yourself with the terrain.

Leh City Seen From The Roof of Leh Palace

Accommodation: Guesthouse in Leh.

Tip: Stay hydrated, eat light meals, and avoid physical exertion.

Day 2: Acclimatisation in Leh and Trek Preparation

Spend another day in Leh to adjust further to the high-altitude environment. This is also the day to ensure your gear is ready for the trek. Attend a mandatory briefing session conducted by the trek leaders, where you'll learn about the route, safety protocols, and what to expect on the ice.

Double-check your trekking equipment, including warm layers, insulated boots, crampons, gloves, and sleeping bags. Explore more of Leh at a leisurely pace, soaking in the vibrant culture and stunning Himalayan views.

Activity: Trek briefing, equipment check, and light exploration. Tip: Enjoy hot fluids like butter tea or soup to stay warm.



Night Camping By The Frozen River

Day 4: Trek from Tilad Do to Shingra Koma (10,550 ft)

• Trek Distance: 10 km (4-5 hours).

Start early to trek over the frozen Chadar, where the icy patterns and cracks create mesmerising textures. Walk through narrow gorges flanked by towering cliffs and marvel at the interplay of sunlight on the frozen river. The trek to Shingra Koma is relatively gentle, allowing you to adjust to the icy terrain.

Accommodation: Tents at Shingra Koma.

Activity: Trekking on the frozen Zanskar, camping, and storytelling by the bonfire.

Tip: Use crampons for better grip and keep your pace steady to avoid slipping.

Day 5: Shingra Koma to Tibb Cave (10,800 ft)

• Trek Distance: 14 km (6-7 hours).

This is a longer trekking day, offering dramatic views of the

Accommodation: Guesthouse in Leh.

Activity: Relaxation and celebration in Leh.

Tip: Treat yourself to a warm meal and rest after your adventure.

Imbe in Okayama, the heart of Bizen pottery, offers workshops, traditional kilns, and galleries, while the vibrant Bizen Pottery Festival celebrates this treasured art form annually.

KALAMKARI: ANDHRA PRADESH'S HAND-PAINTED MARVEL

Kalamkari, a traditional art form from Andhra Pradesh, is a stunning example of India's rich textile heritage. The word "Kalamkari" comes from two Persian words: kalam (pen) and kari (work), meaning "pen work." The process involves preparing the canvas by coating cloth with a mix of chalk and gum, followed by meticulous hand-painting using fine brushes made from animal hair. Artisans use natural colours sourced from minerals and plants, ensuring the art remains eco-friendly.

ZELLIJ TILES: THE MESMERISING GEOMETRIC ART OF MOROCCO

Zellij tiles are a stunning example of Morocco's Islamic art, celebrated for their intricate geometric patterns and vibrant colours. Introduced to India by Persian artisans during the Mughal era, Meenakari flourished under the patronage of Rajasthan's rulers. The crafting process of Meenakari jewellery begins with engraving designs onto a metal base, typically gold or silver. Coloured glass powders are applied to the grooves and then heated to form a lustrous enamel surface. This labour-intensive process results in jewellery pieces that are radiant and unique.





As the granaries brim with fresh produce, the festivities come alive with an array of mouthwatering dishes like Til Pitha, Masor Tenga, Paro Mangxo, and more. These dishes, rooted in Assam's culture, transform Magh Bihu into a vibrant celebration of food, family, and gratitude.

Assam offers a diverse and vibrant culinary heritage that is as rich and varied as its landscapes. From lush tea gardens to sprawling river valleys, Assam's natural bounty is reflected in its food, which showcases unique ingredients and timehonoured cooking techniques. We are exploring a selection of local delicacies that are a must-try for anyone visiting Assam this Bihu season.

BHOGALI JALPAN

Bhogali Jolpan is the heart of Magh Bihu celebrations, offering a delicious spread of traditional Assamese breakfast delicacies. It typically includes chira (flattened rice), doi (curd), and gur (jaggery), accompanied by a variety of pithas like til pitha and ghila pitha, along with sesame and coconut laddoos. This wholesome and flavorful combination symbolizes the abundance of the harvest season, with each ingredient sourced locally and prepared with love. Simple yet deeply satisfying, Bhogali Jolpan reflects Assam's rich culinary heritage and the joy of sharing meals with family and friends during this festive time.

MASOR TENGA

Masor Tenga or Tangy Fish Curry is a must-have in any traditional Assamese Thali. Known for its light, tangy flavour,

this refreshing dish is especially popular during the hot summer season. The curry gets its signature sourness from Elephant Apple or kokum and tomatoes, which, along with the subtle flavours of fried fish, create a satisfying taste.

Often enjoyed after a hearty meal, Masor Tenga is believed to aid digestion, making it a comforting finish to a lavish spread. Simple and quick to prepare, this curry pairs perfectly with steamed rice. Perfectly balanced, Masor Tenga is a delicious example of Assamese culinary tradition.

PARO MANGXO

In Assamese cuisine, pigeon meat curry is a cherished traditional dish, typically cooked with tender pigeon meat, potatoes, onions, and a rich blend of spices like garlic, ginger, pepper, and chillies. The gravy has a balanced consistency—not too thick, yet not too runny—perfect for savouring with rice.

However, making it is a labour-intensive process since it involves meticulously cleaning and cutting the pigeons. Because of this intensive preparation, pigeon curry is reserved for special occasions, such as family gatherings or when children and grandchildren visit. It's also a go-to Assamese dish for comforting those under the weather, especially with colds or fevers.

KHORIKAT DIYA GAHORI MANGXO

Khorikat Diya Gahori Mangxo is a traditional style of slowcooked pork barbecue and is a particular highlight of Assam's rich culinary heritage and its love for smoky flavours. This dish is prepared with marinated pork grilled over an open flame using bamboo sticks. The unique cooking method and the subtle infusion of smoky bamboo essence make this dish a favourite among food enthusiasts.

The slow roasting over bamboo not only makes the pork tender and juicy but also gives it a deliciously smoky

aroma that can't be replicated with modern grills or ovens. As the pieces turn golden and crispy, the dish is ready to be savoured, often served during family gatherings or special celebrations like Magh Bihu.

PANI XAMUK

In the culinary culture of Assam, Pani Hamuk or water snails is an exotic delicacy that celebrates the region's close relationship with nature and bold cooking traditions. For those familiar with Assamese dishes like silkworms and pigeon curry, Pani Hamuk offers another adventurous taste experience, one that has been part of Assam's food culture for generations.

The preparation of this dish involves freshwater snails, typically cooked with ingredients like potatoes and pumpkin, which add depth and balance to the flavours. What truly sets Pani Hamuk apart, though, is the eating experience itself. One sucks the meat directly from the snail shells, which preserves the essence of the flavours. While it may be seen as an unusual dish to outsiders, it is enjoyed in Assan for its earthy flavours and the tactile enjoyment it offers and is often served as a special treat for seasonal festivities.

DUCK WITH BLACK SESAME SEEDS

Homestyle curries from Assam are renowned for their distinctive and bold flavours, often featuring unique, regional ingredients that make them stand out. One such is Til Diya Hanh Mangxo, a black sesame duck curry usually reserved for special occasions. In this Assamese dish, the star ingredient is til, or black sesame seeds, which bring a unique smoky, nutty depth to the flavour profile.

The preparation of this curry involves toasting black sesame seeds to release their oils and enhance their rich, earthy flavour. Once perfectly toasted, the seeds are ground into a fine powder, which is then used to coat tender pieces of duck, creating a hearty, robust dish with layers of smokiness and spice. The spices, along with the sesame, infuse the duck, making it juicy, tender, and deeply flavorful.

POLU OR LETA

If you crave a bit of adventure in your diet, stir-fried Polu or Leta (silkworms) just might be the perfect dish to try. This exotic Assamese dish, often described as crunchy on the outside and soft and moist on the inside, is a celebrated cultural favourite all across the state. While the idea of eating silkworms may surprise some, in Assam, they're a prized delicacy.

This dish is made from the cocoons of silkworms after the silk has been extracted, allowing you to taste the insects themselves without any fibres involved. The silkworms are stir-fried with a blend of spices, creating a savoury, slightly spicy dish with a distinctive crunch that's as satisfying as it is surprising.

GHILA PITHA

Ghila Pitha is particularly enjoyed during the Magh Bihu festival. Unlike other steamed pithas, Ghila Pitha is deep-fried, giving it a distinctive, crispy outer layer that contrasts beautifully with its soft, sweet interior.

Made from wheat flour, jaggery, and freshly grated coconut, the ingredients are combined to form a dough, shaped into small balls, and fried until golden. The result is a crunchy exterior that gives way to a sweet, coconut-infused filling—a perfect blend of texture and flavour.

JOHA SAULOR PAYOKH

In Assam, kheer is distinctively made with black rice, an indigenous variety that gives this dessert a unique, nutty flavour and striking purple hue. Black rice, once rare and reserved only for the wealthy, eventually became accessible to everyone, allowing this special dessert to become a household favourite. Joha Saulor Payokh is a symbolic Assamese dish often prepared during festivals like Magh bihu.

All the dishes are markedly different from others, and you may have to go to specific places to try them out. However, these are also a glimpse of the breadth and medley of Assamese culture.


